COUNCIL BLUFFS DEFEATS OMAHA

Bluffs High School Basketball

**BOWLERS FROM ACROSS RIVER
FIND THE LOCALS TOO

Once more Council Bluffs has demonstrated its superiority over Omaha. This time it was bowling. In baseball, the Longways outclassed Omaha; in basketball the high school was returned a winner and now it remained for the bowlers to show their class. A picked team of Omaha's classiest pinbusters, consisting of Al Wartchow, Myron Stunz, Ken Sciple, Billy Learn and Hofton (all of whom are going to the championship tournament in Toledo, O., next month) was defeated by five Council Bluffs men on the local alleys, which have recently been planed down to perfection, by exactly twelve pins.

The Omaha cracks piled up an enormous lead in the first game, winning it by more than 120 pins, but the local sharks came back strong in the remaining two matches and won out, 2,735 to 2,723.

In the special doubles, Hofton and K. Sciple beat Bill Hansen and Kenneth Robinson of Council Bluffs by thirteen pins in the first match, but the locals took them on again and fairly swamped them, winning the first game by 144 pins and the second by thirty-seven. The Omaha men admitted defeat and refused to roll the remaining game. Robinson rolled 246 and Hansen 245 in the first game of this match, these scores breaking all records for doubles in this city.

Ray officiating. The G. A. R., of which Judge Carson was a member, did its ritual work for Judge Carson at the church. Excelsior lodge of A. F. and A. M. had charge of the services at the grave. The active pallbearers were members of the Masonic lodge, and were A. K. Geise, W. H. Killpack, C. L. Thomas, F. W. Williams, Henry Leuch and H. J. Morris. The honorary pallbearers were members of the G. A. R. and were John Epperson, J. D. Graham, L. W. Tuleys, C. R. Witters, A. A. Fancher, H. G. Alexander, W. H. Foster, D. Jenkins and William Roper, as flag bearer. Burial was in Fairview cemetery.

The funeral of Jerry T. Lanning was held at St. Francis church at 9 o'clock yesterday, with requiem high mass by Rev. Father Powers. Burial was in St. Joseph cemetery. The pallbearers were members of the Brotherhood of Railway Trainmen and were Fred Loper, Frank Hunt, John Kiely, Tom Fleming, Hodger Howes, Gene Gaisford. Honorary pallbearers were also from the B. R. T.
