Obituary—John Cole

John Cole was born in Columbiana county, Ohio, Sept. 12, 1837, and died at his home northwest of Tingley Saturday, Feb. 5, 1916, aged 78 years, 4 months and 23 days. He was the eldest of seven children, five of whom grew to maturity. He passed his boyhood days in his native county, attending the common schools and completing his education at Beaver Academy. After leaving school he taught for ten winters and one summer in Ohio. He located in Monroe county, Iowa, in 1864, where he followed teaching for four winters, and during the summer months worked at the carpenters trade. In 1870 he purchased his present farm, which was then an unbroken tract of prairie land. He was married in 1876 to Miss Elizabeth McClatchey of North Bend, Neb. To them were born four children—Mrs. Theo C. Allen of Tingley, Rev. John S. of Portland, Ore., Robert T. of Cedar Rapids, Iowa, and Mae F. of Tingley. These, with his wife and one brother, Matthew of Lisbon, Ohio, are left to mourn his loss. In 1883 and again in 1885 he was elected to the state legislature. For forty years he held the office of justice of the peace. He
