### HON. B. H. GARRETT DEAD.

Noted Iowan Dies Suddenly Near Letts—Kentuckian With a History.

Hon. Bernard H. Garrett died suddenly at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Wm. Furnas, near Letts, Thursday morning. He was not feeling as well as usual the night before and the family were up with him a part of the night, but he seemed to get better and fell asleep, and the family, thinking him all right, retired for the night. He was found dead in the morning.

Mr. Garrett was a Kentuckian, having been born in that state about 60 years ago. He came to Iowa in 1852, settling in Muscatine county, near the Louisa county line, which continued to be his home until about ten years ago, when he sold his farm. Since that time his home has been in Letts, Louisa county.

Mr. Garrett was a member of the Kentucky legislature before coming to Iowa. He was for one or two terms representative in the Iowa legislature and was an influential member. He was married twice. By his first wife, who died in 1872, he leaves two children, Middleton Garrett, of Batavia, and Mrs. William Furnas, of Letts, at whose home he died. His brothers and sisters are all gone except one, Hon. Barton Garrett, of Louisa county.

The funeral occurred at Letts on Friday, May 22, at 2 o'clock p. m., with interment at that place.

### SAD PLIGHT OF STRANGER IN STRANGE LAND.

Young Girl From Norway Is Caused Inconvenience by Careless Railway Officials—Difficulty Surmounted With Aid of Conductor Daily.

The first of this week a young lady who had been put off the evening Firefly, sat in the ladies' waiting room at the depot from 4:30 in the afternoon until 8:10 the next morning, suffering from hunger and not being able to converse with anyone, as there was no one around who could understand her language. She had in her possession a ticket from New York to Webster, Iowa, a small station on the Muscatine Western. But to a traveling man and some others she showed a contract calling for passage from Norway to Webster City, Iowa, which is on the Northwestern. Some official had made the blunder and the poor girl was made to suffer. The next morning she was placed aboard the Western and taken to Webster. When she arrived at the place she evidently knew it was not the right town, for she began to cry, and taking some papers from her satchel, showed the contract to Conductor Daily, who readily discovered the mistake. The conductor immediately proceeded to take up a collection to send the unfortunate girl to her right destination.
