She joined the Baptist church at the age of fourteen years. She has been a faithful, loving wife, mother, daughter and sister. She had a sunny disposition and was loved by all who knew her.

The body was brought to Hamburg, Monday morning and taken to the home of her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Willis Vaughn. Funeral services were conducted at Mount Olive church, Wednesday, February 8, at 2 p. m., Rev. D. N. Gilliett officiating. Burial was made in Mount Olive cemetery.

#### Jerry M. Hammond.

Word was received here last week of the death of Jerry M. Hammond at his home in Seattle, Washington, and that the body would be brought to Hamburg for burial. It later developed that the relatives had the body cremated there.

Mr. Hammond was born in Vermillion county, Indiana, June 1, 1850, and died in Seattle, Wash., January 30, 1928, at the age of 77 years, 7 months and 29 days. Mr. Hammond had been in poor health for about a year prior to his death.

He came to Iowa in 1870, settling in Hamburg the same year. He studied law in the office of W. A. Stow and in 1873 was admitted to the Iowa bar and entered the same office in which he had studied as a partner. Mr. Hammond was quite active in the early days of the country and of Hamburg and represented Fremont county several times in the state legislature. He was one of the Democratic leaders of this section of the state. He was a member of the Masonic lodge at Red Oak, Iowa.

He was united in marriage April 16, 1876 to Miss Florence Jones, of Hamburg, who with four children survive. The children are: Frank E., C. C., and Helen Hammond and Mrs. Iva Cottrell, of Seattle.

Private funeral services were held Wednesday, February 1, 1928, at 3:30 p. m. at the Ericson Mortuary at Seattle. The body was cremated.
