publican, Mitchem, said his bill had been drawn in strict regard for principles agreed upon by the farm organizations and in accord with Mr. Roosevelt's Topeka Speech on agriculture.

One feature of the Ronald bill is that it would confine the application of the plan to wheat, cotton, tobacco and rice, eliminating two commodities which were put in on the floor of the house—peanuts and dairy products.

The committee will have the Ronald bill at hand as it begins tomorrow the task of preparing a report to the senate. Members asked Ronald to submit his ideas in legislative form after he testified at the recently concluded hearings. He was one of the pioneers in developing the voluntary domestic allotment idea.

Ronald said today that his plan is so simple it can be stated in three sentences:

"An excise tax in the amount of the tariff, 42 cents per bushel on wheat; 5 cents per pound on cotton; 2 cents per pound on hogs; 5 cents per pound on tobacco; and 1-2 cent per pound on rice, shall be collected from processors on domestic consumption of these products.

"As a condition to the payment of these adjusted benefits, producers will agree to cooperate in any horizontal reduction in production required by the secretary of agriculture, with the advice of the producer."

A BRIDGE CONDEMNED.

The bridge over Drywood creek on the "straight south" road was condemned and barricaded this afternoon by County Engineer Grover Thompson after he had investigated a report that somebody had run a car or truck into the north end of the bridge, and found that the impact had broken a post in the bridge, damaging it so that it is doubtful if it would hold up a light car. The damage was such that it appears an entirely new bridge may have to be built. Beyond the fact that the accident occurred this morning, none of the circumstances are known, nor of the identity of the person or persons involved. Neither was it learned whether or not anybody was injured.

JOHN S. PENNY, DEAD

Poet and Insurance Man of 1233 South Judson Died Today of Heart Trouble.

John Scott Penny, in his eighty-fifth year, of 1233 South Judson street, passed away at 8:45 o'clock this morning at his family home following a four weeks' serious illness. He had been afflicted with a heart ailment, cardiac occlusion. He had been falling for over six months.

Mr. Penny of late years had sold insurance and he wrote some excellent verses at times published in the newspapers.

John Scott Penny was born in Des Moines, Ia., February 10, 1848, and his age was 84 years, 11 months and 27 days.

He was married to Miss Irene Hixson September 28, 1881, in Mills county, Iowa. Besides his devoted wife he is survived by two sons, E. G. Penny, Atchison, Kas., and H. G. Penny, Springfield, Mo. He leaves also a sister, aged 89 years, Mrs. Amanda J. McKee, Enid, Okla., and one grandchild.

Mr. Penny had lived for thirty-eight years in Bourbon county. He came to Kansas in 1894 and settled on a farm near Devon, and moved to Fort Scott in 1900.

Mr. Penny was a member of the Baptist church. He was a man of upright character, a good citizen and devoted to his home and family. He was a former member of the Odd Fellows lodge.

Funeral arrangements will be announced later. The body lies in state at the Konantz mortuary.

FOR DEATH PENALTY

House Committee Votes to Bring Out Bill Making Possible Chair For Killers

Topeka, Feb. 7.—The House Judiciary committee voted today to bring out a bill establishing death on the electric chair and life imprisonment in the state penitentiary as alternate penalties for first degree murder, the jury trying the case to determine which shall be inflicted.

The bill, Chairman Bloss (R) announced would be brought out as a committee measure without recommendation as well another providing for the installation of an electric chair at the penitentiary.

Kansas abolished capital punishment, except for treason, in 1907. Records of the Kansas historical society show, however, the state has not inflicted the death penalty since 1870.

Two years ago the legislature passed the Muir bills to establish death on the electric chair or life imprisonment as alternative penalties for first degree murder and robbery with firearms but they were vetoed by former Governor Harry H. Woodring. The house also passed a bill providing similar penalties for kidnaping, but it failed in the senate.

Chairman Fisher (R) of a house Judiciary sub-committee said he would introduce personally bills providing death and life imprisonment as alternative penalties for first degree robbery with firearms and kidnaping. His purpose, he said, would be to get the measures in printed form before the Judiciary committee.

MRS. IRENE PENNY.

Mrs. Irene Penny, 91, pioneer Fort Scott resident and widow of J. S. Penny, early-day Fort Scott insurance man, died at 1:30 this morning at a nursing home in Springfield, Mo. She had been in failing health for the past eight years, and two years ago entered the Springfield home to be near a son, Hubert, who resides there.

Irene Hixon Penny, the daughter of Leroy and Elizabeth Hixon, was born in Mills County, Iowa, Dec. 28, 1856. She graduated from the Iowa schools and was married Sept. 28, 1881, to John Scott Penny, in Mills county. They came to Kansas in 1894, first settling near Centerville, where the family remained until 1899, when they moved to Fort Scott. For a half century the family home was at 1233 South Judson. Mr. Penny died in 1933.

Surviving are two sons, Hubert G. Penny, Springfield, and Guy Penny, Atchison, Kas. A brother, Elmer Hixon, of Mills County, Iowa, also survives.

Mrs. Penny was a lifelong member of the Baptist church and for years both she and her husband sang in the Baptist choir here. Many old residents will remember much newspaper verse written by her husband.

Funeral services will be at 2 p. m. Thursday at the Konantz chapel, conducted by the Rev. W. H. Johnson. Interment will be at Centerville.

MRS. FLORENCE E. KARBE.

Mrs. Florence Ethel Karbe, 73, owner of a chain of 13 grocery stores, one of which is in Fort Scott, died of a heart attack at 12:50 a. m. yesterday at her home, 311 North Walnut, Pittsburg. She was the widow of Arthur W. Karbe, founder of the grocery chain, who died Feb. 3, 1941.

The local Karbe store will be closed all day tomorrow in respect to the deceased, whose funeral will be held Wednesday at 3:30 p. m. at the Ellsworth chapel in Pittsburg, with Dr. Gordon Thompson in charge. Interment will be made in the Highland Park cemetery.

In addition to the Fort Scott store there are stores in Pittsburg, Girard, Columbus, Baxter Springs, Coffeyville, Nevada, Neosho, Carthage, Webb City, Miami, and two in Joplin. The parent store in Pittsburg was founded in 1910.

Lester H. Lowe, 75, retired farmer of Devon, known to his friends as "Bose" Lowe, died suddenly of a heart attack at 3:15 yesterday afternoon at the city scalehouse on Market square. Though retired from active farming, Mr. Lowe had remained active and lately had done quite a bit of painting. Sixteen days before his death, on his seventy-fifth birthday, he had been painting the interior of a schoolhouse near his home.

Lester H. Lowe was born Aug. 28, 1873, at Albany, Mo., the son of Thomas and Minnie Rariden Lowe. He came with his parents to Bourbon county when he was two years old and had been a resident of the Devon and Mapleton communities ever since. On Sept. 24, 1912, at Moberly, Mo., he married Mary Ella Mundy, who survives.

Also surviving are a daughter, Mrs. Nelma Lee of St. Louis, a step-son, Alvia Deeds, Fort Scott, a brother, Luther Lowe, Fort Scott, and a sister, Mrs. Kate Roberts, Wichita.

Samuel D. Blanke, the subject of this sketch, received a liberal education, and at the age of seventeen was apprenticed to learn the carriage trade, serving his time and becoming a thorough workman. In 1876 he came to Burlington, where for a short time he followed his trade, but two years later, in 1878, embarked in the insurance business in company with Mr. Karmmermeyer. In 1880, he formed the existing partnership, and they have a business second to none in the city. They handle some of the best companies, and insure against fire, life, accident and plate-glass.



HON. JOHN SCOTT PENNEY, one of the leading citizens of Des Moines County, Iowa, residing on section 29, Benton Township, was born on the farm which is still his home. His father, John Penney, was born Sept. 13, 1802, in Washington County, Pa. He was reared upon a farm, and on the 12th of September, 1822, was united in marriage with Rebecca Webbell, who was born Dec. 21, 1804, in Westmoreland County, Pa. After their marriage Mr. Penney rented a farm, and also engaged in milling until 1844, when they decided to take up their residence in this county. Starting for the West they crossed the Mississippi Nov. 14, of that year, settling on section 29, Benton Township, which is still the home of our subject. A farm of 285 acres was purchased, the only improvements being a small log cabin and a few plowed acres. Immediately the work of cultivation was begun, and in a short time it became one of the finest farms in the township. Mr. and Mrs. Penney reared a family of seven children, two having died in infancy; Joseph, a resident of West Burlington, owns and operates a farm in Flint River

Township; Thomas J. is a Baptist minister at Ashland, Neb.; Sarah, wife of M. H. Jackson, a resident farmer of Benton Township; Phoebe, wife of Alvin Todd, a resident farmer of Plattsmouth, Neb.; Lydia, wife of W. B. Kaster, of Benton Township; Amanda, still at home with her mother; and our subject, who has charge of the home place.

John Penney departed this life Dec. 14, 1886, aged eighty-four years. He was a devoted member of the Baptist Church, always took an active part in Church work, and contributed liberally to the upbuilding of the cause of Christ during his entire life. He aided largely in the building of the old Pisgah Church, and labored faithfully in raising funds for its erection. From 1846 until the time of his death he served as Senior Deacon. Not only in religious, but also in educational matters he was greatly interested, and gave his children the best possible advantages. In his political views he was a Democrat, an earnest worker for his party, and by that organization was elected to the office of Justice of the Peace and to the Board of Supervisors. In 1848 he became a member of the General Assembly, serving one term. Mrs. Penney, the mother of our subject, is now in her eighty-fourth year, and is a remarkably well preserved lady. Since her childhood she has been an active worker in the Church and Sunday-school. The fiftieth wedding anniversary of this worthy couple was celebrated Sept. 12, 1872, at their own home, and was largely attended, people being present from six different States, and several were present who witnessed their union a half-century before. Their anniversary day has always been a glad day for their children, who have now all grown to be Christian men and women, and do honor to their parents' name.

Our subject, Hon. John Scott Penney, was reared upon a farm and educated in the common schools of this county. Being the youngest of the family he remained with his parents until his marriage with Miss Irene Hixson, which occurred Sept. 28, 1881. Mrs. Penney is a native of this county, and is a daughter of Leroy Hixson. Two children were born of their union—Eugene Guy and Hubert Graham. Mr. and Mrs. Penney are members of the Baptist Church, of which he is Treasurer. Politi-

cally he is a Democrat, and was elected by that party a member of the Twenty-first General Assembly in 1886. He was a candidate for County Recorder in 1880, but was defeated. Mr. Penney is a practical farmer and operates about 300 acres of land. He makes a specialty of raising small fruits, taking great interest in studying the habits of the plants, and every year ships several thousand quarts of berries to the North. Everything on his land denotes thrift and industry, and as a business man and citizen he receives the respect of all.



NIXON FULLERTON, Sheriff of Des Moines County, Iowa, and one of the early settlers of the same, was born in the County Tyrone, Ireland, on the 12th of July, 1827. His parents were John and Lucinda (Nixon) Fullerton, the father of Scotch and the mother of English descent. Nineteen children graced the union of this worthy couple, seven of whom are living, four daughters and three sons, all of whom hold respectable positions in the communities where they reside. In early life John Fullerton was a member of the Presbyterian Church, and Mrs. Fullerton was reared an Episcopalian, but later both became members of the Wesleyan Methodist Church, dying in that faith.

Nixon Fullerton grew to manhood in his native country, receiving a liberal education in the public schools. When nineteen years of age, being quite an extensive reader, and hearing of the chances in America, he decided to try his fortune in a free country. Bidding his father good-by, he started out for the New World. Landing in Charleston, and passing through the Southern States, where he saw the negroes held in bondage, he came to the conclusion that if this was what they called freedom, he was ready to return to Ireland. He was then on his way to Burlington, but while passing through the Slave States, he settled one point in his mind, and that was that he would never vote the Democratic ticket, and to this resolution he has always adhered. He was among the first to advocate the Republican principles, and cast his vote in 1856 for Fremont.

Mr. Fullerton was one of the early settlers of

Burlington, taking up his residence there in 1846. Soon after coming to the city he was employed as clerk in the store of his brother John, remaining with him until, on account of the gold fever in 1849, the brother sold out and went to California. He soon after received employment with J. S. Kimball & Co., remaining with them until 1865. He was in the employ of C. B. Parsons for twenty years, from 1867 until 1887, at the end of which time he was nominated by the Republicans as Sheriff of Des Moines County, and was elected over the Democratic nominee by four hundred majority, overcoming a Democratic majority in the county of twelve hundred votes.

On the 11th of September 1855, the marriage of Mr. Fullerton with Miss Helen Clarke, a native of Louisville, Ky., was celebrated. She is the eldest daughter of Alfred Clarke, who came to this county some time in the "30's," settling near Danville. He subsequently removed to Burlington, where he was engaged in the mercantile and milling business. Mr. and Mrs. Fullerton have three living children—Margaret, Mary Grey and Jennie E. Mr. Fullerton is a member of the Irish-American Political Association and Vice President of the same. He is in every sense of the word a gentleman, honest, straight-forward, and ready to extend a helping hand in any good cause. He has a host of solid friends, who consider him in the light of an excellent host, and will doubtless remember him into the far future.


