H, Thirty-first Regiment, Ohio Volunteer Infantre, of which eompany, through different grades in promotion, became captain, and at the close of the war, returned from the field in command of the regiment, and was complimented for his services as such commander by the rank of brevet-major. On his return from the army he entered the law department of the University of Michigan as a student, and in 1867 graduated therein, having in the meantime between sessions read law in the office of Buckinghan © Kibler, of Newark, Ohio; in 1867 he came to Iowa, and stopped a few months at Des Moines, where he was admitted to practice in the differenf courts, and during which time he was acGrainting himself with the State statutes and practice; in June, 1868, he located at Winteset, an entire stranger, and commenced the practice of his profession; at that time the Winterset bar had a
