

MAJOR ELI WILKIN.

Major Eli Wilkin died at his boyhood home in Purity, Licking county, Ohlo, Tuesday, May 13th, from the effects of paralysis from which had Major been a sufferer for four years. Wilkin was born Feb. 19th, 1838 in Licking county and was raised on the farm, attending the common schools during the winters. When 21 years of age he borrowed money with which he pursued the course of study at the Hayesville, Ohio, academy. Just after the battle of Bull: Run he left school and enlisted in Co. II 31st Ohio volunteers. He served with this Co. thru the war and returned at its close in command of the company as its captain. On the return of his regiment Captain Wilkin was complimented with the rank of Brevet Major in consideration of gallant and distinguished services at the battle of Missionary Ridge where he was severely wounded After the close of in the shoulder. the war he pursued the study of law graduating from the University of Michigan in 1867. Mejor Wilkin Dead,

Maj. Eli Wilkin died at his home at Purity. Licking county, Ohio, at three o'clock s. m., May 13. 1902, aged a little over sixty-four years. His best years were spent in Winterset. He settled here about 1868, and began the practice of law. He soon developed a large practice, and for several years was a partner of S. G. Ruby. He was a member of the state senate from 1883 to 1667, and in earlier years had held several city offices. About 1890 he emigrated to Washington and settled in Fairbaven. He soon attracted attention and was meeting well deserved success, when his health failed and he went back to his early home in Ohio, where he had always had property in-His death was caused by tcrests. paralysis. He was much weakened by former strokes, and his once good constitution succumed to an attack that found him too much enfeebled to resist.

Maj. Wilkin will long be remembered in Winterset, where he had hosts of friends.

H, Thirty-first Regiment, Ohio Volunteer Infantry, of which company, through different grades in promotion, became captain, and at the close of the war, returned from the field in command of the regiment, and was complimented for his services as such commander by the rank of brevet-major. On his return from the army he entered the law department of the University of Michigan as a student, and in 1867 graduated therein, having in the meantime between sessions read law in the office of Buckingham & Kibler, of Newark, Ohio; in 1867 he came to Iowa, and stopped a few months at Des Moines, where he was admitted to practice in the different courts, and during which time he was acquainting himself with the State statutes and practice; in June, 1868, he located at Winteset, an entire stranger, and commenced the practice of his profession; at that time the Winterset bar had a

G. Ruby became associated as partners in the practice, and have so continued to the present time; he may well be termed a self-made man; impelled by worthy ambition he has made his way in the world, and achieved an enviable reputation among his associates at the bar.
