**A MOULTON PIONEER
 DIES AT FOUR SCORE**

Rev. Samuel Jourdan Pays the Debt of Nature.

Samuel Jourdan, aged 82 years, died at his home southwest of Moulton, on Thursday morning. He was a native of Virginia and moved from that state to Indiana, from there to Illinois and from that state to Drakeville, coming to his last location in 1860. Uncle Sam was the father of seven children, 3 boys and 4 girls—all living. Deceased endured the hardship of pioneer life and was a respected citizen. In religion he belonged to the Church of Christ, and as local minister was widely known. Burial occurs today at Orleans, along side of the good wife who preceded to the spirit land many years ago.
