Death of Hon. T. M. C. Logan.

Died at his home near Centralia, Missouri, August 20, 1903, T. M. C. Logan, one of the early pioneers of Harrison county. Mr. Logan was born at Rushville, Rush county, Indiana, and moved to Logan in 1867 thus identifying himself with the early history of Harrison county. He was an active worker in the political history of western Iowa, and was elected state senator from this district in 1881, also served as county commissioner in the county with credit to himself and his constituents. He was also president of the Grain Dealers Association for several years.

Mr. Logan was an enthusiastic temperance worker—believing that the welfare of our country lay in the temperance and sobriety of its people. Like many of the representative men of our times Mr. Logan was identified with various civic societies. He belonged to the Masonic Lodge No. 220, A. F. and A. M. Missouri Valley Chapter, and Ivanhoe Commandery of Knights Templar at Council Bluffs and was also an honored member of the I. O. O. F. at Logan.

He was married to Charlotte Snodgrass in 1851 who died at Cedar Rapids, Iowa, in 1866. He was married to Harriet M. Herbert of Cedar Rapids, in 1867. He leaves a wife and ten children to mourn his loss; one daughter, Mable, having died August 29, 1902. He was one of the most genial and social of men and one of the kindest of neighbors. He was always found steadfast in the principles which he advocated. He was a kind husband and a loving father. Mr. Logan's health commenced to fail about three years ago and for the last six months he had been confined to his home. He died at the age of 73 years 6 months and 7 days, surrounded by wife and children who did all in their power to alleviate his suffering.
