The funeral services for William Henry McCullough were held Saturday afternoon from the home, 1235 1/2th Street, Newburg, Iowa, at 2 o'clock. The Rev. H. H. McCulloch officiated. Burial was in Hazelton cemetery and the pallbearers were all relatives.

William Henry McCullough was born in Scotland, Mass. on December 15, 1854. He died at his home in Grinnell, Iowa, on September 27, 1930. He was a member of the Methodist church.

His father was the Elder Wm. McCullough who with three brothers preached the gospel country of Iowa for many years in Illinois and southern Iowa.

In 1880 the family moved from Massachusetts to Illinois and later to Iowa where he remained until he brought land but returned to Illinois to make his home. Mr. McCullough was the eldest of the family of three children. His brother and sister were John and Mary.

A progressive farmer, he was among the first to use new types of machinery as they were developed, among them the steel tower windmill, hay slings and various types of the self binder.

In November, 1904, he and his wife moved to Grinnell where he has resided continuously since. In Grinnell he has served on the City Council and has always been recognized as a worker in the cause of right.

In 1927 Mr. and Mrs. McCulloch celebrated their sixtieth wedding anniversary when they were congratulated by a host of friends and relatives.

Mrs. McCulloch passed away on Jan. 6, 1930.

He leaves two daughters, Mrs. M. H. Rowe of Grinnell and Mrs. Geo. W. Lane of Newburg; two sons J. W. McCulloch of Kanawha and H. H. McCulloch of Newburg, eleven grandchildren and eleven great grandchildren.

Pall bearers were the five grandsons and one great grandson, George and Carroll Lane, Harold and James McCulloch, Ralph Ballard and Floyd Ashing.

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H. H. McCulloch farmed until moving to Newburg in 1935. He had been a school board member before 1925 and helped plan the new Newburg School in 1925. He was a shareholder of the Newburg Farmers Elevator and a board member. He also was a member of Cyrus Masonic Lodge #338 for almost sixty-seven years.

Edith (Sheppy) McCulloch died December 28, 1938 and H. H. McCulloch died September 23, 1960. Both are buried at the Hickory Grove Cemetery.

McCULLOCH, WILLIAM HENRY

William Henry McCulloch, son of Rev. William and Sally (Blake) McCulloch of Ashfield, Mass., was born December 15, 1844. When he was 12, the family moved to Lee County, Illinois.

On March 2, 1867, William Henry McCulloch was united in marriage to Ellen S. Allen of Silver Creek, Michigan. In 1869, they moved to Hickory Grove Township, about two miles west of Newburg on a farm.

They were the parents of four children:

Minnie H. McCulloch, born January 26, 1868 at Lamoyille, Illinois.

James William McCulloch, born October 25, 1869 at Dunkirk, Wisc.

Henry Harold McCulloch, born December 7, 1871 at Newburg, Iowa.

Lillian Leona McCulloch, born December 15, 1873 at Newburg, Iowa.

William H. McCulloch was a farmer until he retired in 1904 and moved to Grinnell, Iowa. He served in the Iowa Legislature in 1884. Mr. McCulloch brought Angus cattle to this area and maintained the herd until his retirement. His son, Henry Harold McCulloch carried on the Angus herd.

Ellen (Allen) McCulloch died January 31, 1931 and William H. McCulloch died September 27, 1934.

James Harley McIlrath, son of J. Harley and Genevieve McIlrath, and Patricia Joy Henchal, daughter of the Will Henchal's, were married on February 11, 1959 in Grinnell, Iowa. Both attended and graduated from Newburg High School, Jim with the class of 1957 and Pat with the last class to graduate from Newburg High School in 1958.

They are the parents of a son, James Harley McIlrath III, born January 2, 1961. He is presently a student at Grinnell Newburg High School.

After twelve years with the Co-op Elevator, Newburg branch, Jim is farming fulltime east of Newburg in Poweshiek County.

McILRATH, JAMES P.

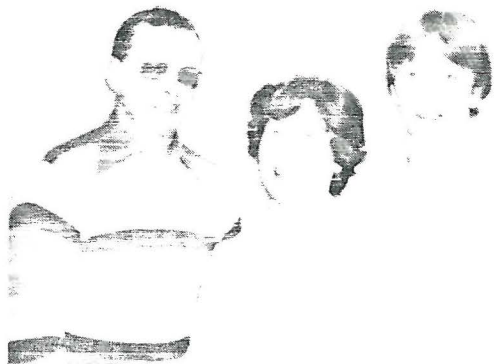
James Paul McIlrath was born February 15, 1859, near Culleybackey, County Antrim, N. Ireland. He came to America in 1883 at the age of 24 and established a home southwest of Gilman, Iowa.

On December 25, 1889, he was married to Emma Mc Kee who passed away on November 1, 1890. They had one daughter, Sarah. Sarah was married to Harlan Maurer. Sarah and Harlan are both deceased.

On September 18, 1894, James was married to Elizabeth Houseman of Laurel, Iowa. Elizabeth was born October 18, 1878 at Holland, Michigan, moving to the Laurel area as a child. They lived west of Gilman until 1897, when they purchased a farm two and one-half miles west of Newburg from Charles Rowe. They continued to live on this farm until their deaths.

Their children are: Elizabeth (McIlrath) Jack; John W. McIlrath; Emma (McIlrath) Claybrook; Mabel (McIlrath) Tharp; Ruby McIlrath; J. Harley McIlrath and Lucille (McIlrath) Anthony, all living in the Grinnell and Newburg areas. One son, James, died in infancy.
