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Death of E. C. Sudlow.

At the age of seventy-two years, two months and twenty-five days, Egbert C. Sudlow passed away Friday morning, Nov. 30th, at ten o'clock, at his late home on East North street. His death came as a surprise to his friends for he was only ill for a short time, being confined to his bed about one week.

Deceased was born September 8, 1834, in Litchfield county, Connecticut, moving to Ohio with his parents when but a child. In 1856, he came to Scott county, Iowa, and thirteen years later, in 1869, he was married to Miss Eliza D. Bartlett, and he and his bride soon afterward settled on a farm fifteen miles southeast of Newton.

All their children were born on the old farm place, two sons and three daughters: Harry E., Fred E., and Alice, Edith and Mary, all of whom survive him and were present at the funeral. Besides his wife and children he is survived by three sisters, Mrs. Henry Egbert, and the Misses Phoebe W. and Lucy M. Sudlow, of Davenport, Iowa.

The funeral was held at the home last Sunday afternoon, at two o'clock, Rev. O. S. Baker of the First Methodist Episcopal church, conducting the services. A large concourse of friends were in attendance at the funeral to pay their last respects to him whom they so highly esteemed and loved.

In the death of E. C. Sudlow, Jasper County has lost one of its best citizens. He was a man of the strictest integrity, of the highest morals, and whose word was as good as his bond. As a citizen, father, husband and friend, few were entitled to more worthy consideration, and he leaves behind him a memory that those who knew him will cherish most. He was elected as State Senator from Jasper county, in 1881 and served four years, with credit to himself and with honor to his constituents. He joined the Methodist Episcopal church in Newton, in 1866, and lived a life consistent with the professions he then made.

The remains were laid to rest in our cemetery north of the city.

An Old Settler Dies

Died at his home in Malaka township at 10:40 Saturday, Dec. 1, 1906, Albert L. Harrah, aged 63 years and 10 months.

While Mr. Harrah has been sick for about two years, his death came as a shock to the community in which he has lived for so many years. Bright's Disease and rheumatism has been his trouble, but hemorrhage was the immediate cause of his death. He was born at Hopedale, Harrison county, Ohio. Moved to Iowa in 1856, and to Jasper county in 1858. His father settled on the Riverside farm, on which he died, and for which was originally paid \$1.25 an acre, but is now one of the finest farms in the county. May 23, 1864, he enlisted in Company B, 46th Iowa, served for about eight months and was honorably discharged. He has always taken an active interest in national, state and county politics, and has been a candidate of the Democratic party for State and County offices. He has been an extensive breeder and dealer in Short Horn cattle, and at one time owned one of the largest herds in the state. He has held various township offices, and has been president of the Farmers' Insurance Company for twelve years, and president and Secretary of the Jasper County Agricultural Society.

Nov. 12, 1866, he married Bessie A. Dodge, and to this union two children were born, Mary E. and George D., who together with his wife survive him.

Of late years he was quite prominent in the building of a trolley line out of Davenport and interested in Davenport property.

Few men in Jasper County were better known than Mr. Harrah, and few men had more or warmer friends. He was genial, kind and courteous, and he will be missed and mourned by those among whom he has lived so long and taken so active a part.

The funeral was held yesterday afternoon, and the body laid to rest in the Newton Cemetery.

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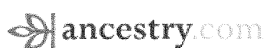
Those who knew him well did not consider him as especially anxious for political preferment, but he was nevertheless nominated and elected to the State senate, serving in the 14th General Assembly. Possessing a genial, social nature, enjoying the highest confidence as a business man, he was at once recognized as a leader in the senate. He was a charter member of the first Congregational church of Waterloo, with which he had been connected from the first.

JAMES D. YEOMANS was born in Bennington, Wyoming county, N. Y., April 21, 1845; he died in Washington, D. C., Oct. 31, 1906. He was educated in the public schools of New York. At the age of seventeen he was employed on the Erie railroad and for many years continued in the work of constructing railways. During the war the Government employed him in railroading in the South. In 1888 he removed to Onawa, Iowa, and engaged in stock-raising. He served as State senator in the 24th and 25th General Assemblies, but on April 2, 1894, before the expiration of his last term, President Cleveland appointed him a member of the Interstate Commerce Commission. He was re-appointed by President McKinley for a term of six years. While in Iowa Judge Yeomans was active commercially and organized the Sioux City Jobbers and Manufacturers' Association, the purpose of which was to prevent discrimination by railroads against Iowa cities in the making of rates.

JOHN DOWNEY was born in Belfast, Ireland, in 1834; he died in Charleston township, Lee county, Iowa, Oct. 29, 1906. He migrated to this country at the age of twenty, settling at first in the city of New York. After two years he went to Ohio, and soon after came to Iowa settling in Lee county in the spring of 1857, where he spent the remainder of his life. He held many local positions of honor and trust, but his principal public service was as State senator, to which position he was elected in 1893, serving in the 25th and 26th General Assemblies. He was for twenty years justice of the peace of his township. He was all his life a democrat and his party honored him with several local distinctions.

EGBERT C. SUDLOW was born in Litchfield county, Conn., Sept. 8, 1834; he died in Newton, Iowa, Nov. 30, 1906. When a child he moved with his parents to Ohio; in 1856 he came to Scott county, Iowa; in 1869 he settled on a farm near Newton, where he became one of the influential and well-known citizens of Jasper county. He served as State senator in the 19th and 20th General Assemblies.

THOMAS W. JOHNSTON was born in County Mayo, Ireland, in 1840; he died in Dubuque, Iowa, Nov. 30, 1906. In early youth he came to America with his parents settling in Indiana and a few years later locating on a farm in Dubuque county. He represented Dubuque county in the 15th and 16th General Assemblies. For many years he was superintendent of the county poor farm.

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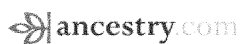

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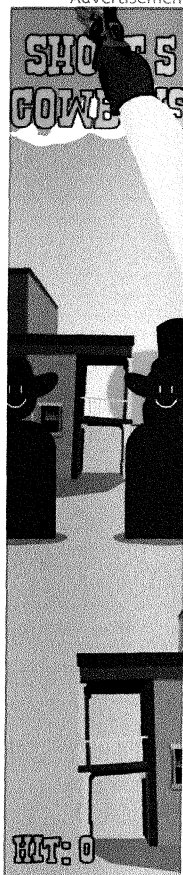
