HON. WM. BAUGHMAN DEAD

Passed away at his home Tuesday Morning from Heart Trouble

William Baughman, one of the best known men in the county, at one time member of the state legislature, and a resident of the county since 1855, died at his home in this city about eight o'clock Tuesday morning. Monday night he was taken with a heart attack and sank, despite all that could be done for him, till he died. The word of his death came as a decided shock and surprise here, as it was not known that he was ill.

Mr. Baughman was born in Westmoreland county, Penn., on June 19, 1828, of "Pennsylvania Dutch" stock, being the son of Jacob and Margaret (Cort) Baughman, the former dying in Pennsylvania in 1884 and the latter in 1882. Mr. Baughman was one of a family of eight sons and five daughters.

In the spring of 1855 Mr. Baughman made his first trip to Iowa alone, taking up land in sections 4 and 5 Pleasant township, which was entered by his father, Jacob Baughman. He then went back to Pennsylvania for his wife and children and came west again in the fall of that year. When he came he came across the old Mormon trail to Iranistan and came in a prairie schooner drawn by four horses. He cut logs that winter and built a cabin on his claim and the cabin he then built was the first house in Pleasant township. Mr. Baughman's original farm consists of half section of land which he improved for nearly forty years or until 1894 when he removed from the old homestead to the town of Griswold. He added to his land from time to time till he owned 1100 acres, much of which he had disposed of from time to time but a goodly portion of which he retained. In 1881 he was elected representative from this county in the state legislature and served two years therein. He was married in 1850 to Julia B. Schwartz, a native of Germany, who came to the United States in childhood. Nine children were the result, eight of whom were living. He was a devoted member of the M. E. church.

The funeral services will be held from the home this Thursday morning at ten o'clock, conducted by Rev. J. McGuinness, after which the remains will be conveyed to the cemetery at Lewis and laid among the friends and relatives who have gone before.

MRS. MARY HUCKINS DEAD

Passed Away at her Home in this Friday. Funeral Sunday.

After an illness of considerable duration Mrs. Mary, widow of the late Moses Huckins, passed away at her home in this city. For a long time she had been in poor health and while her death was expected at any time yet when the end came it cast a gloom over the neighborhood.

The funeral services were held in the M. E. church in this city Sunday afternoon at two o'clock conducted by Rev. Chas. A. Johnson after which the remains were taken to the Flint cemetery and laid beside the husband.

Mary (Heath) Huckins was born at Stanstead, Quebec, October 12, 1832, and died at Griswold, Iowa, January 17, 1931, after a long and lingering sickness, leaving her at the time of her departure 80 years, 3 months, and 5 days of age.

She was united in marriage to Moses Huckins, June 12th, 1851, at Derby, Vermont. Shortly after her marriage she moved with her husband to Neponset, Illinois, where they remained until 1888 when they came to Griswold, where she still resided at the time of her death.

Her husband died at Griswold, August 20, 1890, over twenty-two years ago. To this union ten children were born, three daughters and seven sons. One daughter died in infancy, one, Winona L., died June 2, 1869, at Griswold, and one son Henry R., died November 16, 1887, at Blue Springs, Nebraska. The surviving children are J. R., of Kansas City, E. A., of Lancaster, Minnesota, S. A., of Oakwood, Oklahoma, Mrs. Zella L. Medley, of Belvue, Kansas, C. W., E. G., and Claude, of Griswold.

She has been a devoted Christian since her childhood. In Illinois she was a member of the Baptist church, after removing to Griswold she united with the M. E. church. One grandson R. R. Huckins, of Kansas City, and all the surviving children, except E. A., of Lancaster, Minnesota, who was to see her recently and S. A., of Oklahoma, were present at the last sad rites.
