Well Known Farmer and Man Active in Many Lines of Endeavor Called

## LIVED IN -COUNTY SEVENTY-TWO YEARS

George W. Dickins, one of the most widely known and influential men of the county, died at 4:30 a. m. today in the Ottumwa hospital where he was taken the first of this week for an operation.

The name of George W. Dickins has always been closely associated with the political history and agricultural development of this community for he twice represented his district in the state legislature and did many other things to mould public thought and action in relation to affairs of general moment.

### A NATIVE OF OHIO.

Mr. Dickins was born in Wyandot county, Ohio, September 18, 1843, a son of Martin and Elizabeth Staley Dickins. In the year of 1845 Martin Dickins and his family moved to Iowa, settling in Wapello county, where he purchased a claim and lived until his death, March 2, 1890. His farm comprised 320 acres in Competine township, the greater part of which was still unbroken when it came into his possession.

#### FOUGHT FOR UNION.

When a youth of 19 years, he went to the front in defense of the union. enlisting August 12, 1862, at Davenport as a member of Co. I, first regiment-of-lowa-cavalry, of which he afterward became quartermaster.

He was with his command for three years and eight months, participating largely in campaigns in the west and he was mustered out of service at Austin, Tex., February 14, 1866.

At the close of the war Mr. Dickins returned to Wapello county and began farming on the Competine township tract which has since been his home.

## WAS MARRIED TWICE.

On June 22, 1864, Mr. Dickins was married to Elizabeth Hawthorne, native of Virginia who had come to Iowa in 1853. Of their four children two lived to adult ages, Mary, the wife of O. E. Dickey, and Hiram B.

Forty-three years ago today Mrs. Dickins died and on March 30, 1875, Mr. Dickins married Miss Martha 'C. Eller, who was a daughter of Harvey and Caroline Vannoy Eller, residents of Jefferson county.

Mr. and Mrs. Dickins became the parents of a son and two daughters, Scott M. married and both he and his wife passed away, leaving two sons, Earl and Lloyd, who have made their home with their grandfather. May Dickey and Katherine Baldwin are the two daughters. They now reside in Competine township. Nineteen grandchildren and two great grandchildren also survive.

#### IN STATE LEGISLATURE.

After serving the republican party in various township positions Mr. Dickins was elected to the nineteenth general assembly of Iowa in 1881 and in 1897 was again chosen to represent his district in the house, serving in the twenty-seventh assembly. He was a member of the Methodist church and was past commander of the Grand Army post in his community.
