MAJ. HOLMES DEAD

Passes Away at Clarinda Tuesday,
January 21.

THE BODY ARRIVED THIS NOON

The Funeral Will Be Thursday Afternoon at
the House, 721 Carroll St.—Mr. Holmes
Was A Lieut., Representative, Con-
gressman—Sketch of His Life.

The sad news of the death of Maj. A. J. Holmes at the hospital at Clarinda reached this city Tuesday afternoon about 4:00 o'clock. None of the particulars could be learned at the time, as to the hour of death nor the funeral arrangements. The body arrived this noon on No. 4 from Clarinda and was taken to the Holmes residence at 721 Carroll street. The funeral will be held Thursday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock from the house. The services will be in charge of Rev. O. H. L. Mason and the burial will be in Linwood by the side of his two children. About two years ago he was taken to the hospital at Clarinda with a hope that he would get better but he grew worse until death came Tuesday.

Anderson Judson Holmes was born in Wayne County, Ohio, March 2nd, 1843. Until he reached the age of twelve years he lived in his native county and received the education afforded at that time. In 1855 the family removed to Palmyra Wisconsin, where he studied. In the spring of 1862 he entered the 24th Wisconsin Infantry as a private but later was mustered out to accept a commission in the 37th Wisconsin Co. I as First Lieutenant. He saw hard service during the war and in one engagement he was wounded. It was in the battle of Stone River that he was wounded. He was taken prisoner by the Confederates at the explosion of the mine at Pittsburg and was confined in various southern prisons for a period of eight months.

After being mustered out of the service of the United States he returned to Wisconsin and attended school at Milton College. He graduated from this college and entered the University of Michigan at Ann Arbor and pursued his studies there. He graduated from this institution in 1867 and the same year came to Boone County and took

MRS. SAM STEPHENS DEAD

Milton College. He graduated from this college and entered the University of Michigan at Ann Arbor and pursued the study of law. He graduated from this institution in 1867 and the same year came to Boone County and took up his residence in the new town of Boone. He entered into partnership with Hon. L. W. Reynolds in the law business and for many years this firm was the leading one in this part of the state. In 1880 he was elected mayor of Boone and held this office until elected Representative from Boone County to the Legislature at Des Moines. He served the county one term, that during the winter of 1881.

He returned to Boone after serving in Des Moines and in 1883 was elected to the National Congress at Washington as Congressman from this district. He served three terms in the House and afterwards was made sergeant-at-arms in the house. He was connected with the removal of the fort at Harper's Ferry to Chicago during the World's Fair. This did not turn out as was expected and Mr. Holmes lost heavily. Mr. Holmes came to Boone from Washington and opened up a law office and had a large business until taken sick some two years ago. He was prominently identified with the growth of the city.

He was married to Miss Emma J. Folsom, a cousin of Mrs. Grover Cleveland, on February 28 1878. The wedding took place in Boone. Three children were born to them, one of whom with his mother survive him. One child died in infancy and another Harold Judson died at the age of two and a half years. The son remaining is Clarence F. Holmes.

Mr. Holmes was a man who was determined to win in whatever he undertook. While at school he was never satisfied with merely getting a lesson but always mastered it thoroughly. This was characteristic of his later life. During his school years he was popular with his mates and occupied a prominent part in the club and social life. While a man of great force of character, yet he was kind hearted and affable and made friends of all with whom he had dealings. The widow and son are given the sympathy of all in their bereavement.

RAILROAD MEN ORGANIZE

Superintendents of the Lines in Iowa Hold an Important Meeting in Des Moines and Organize a Club

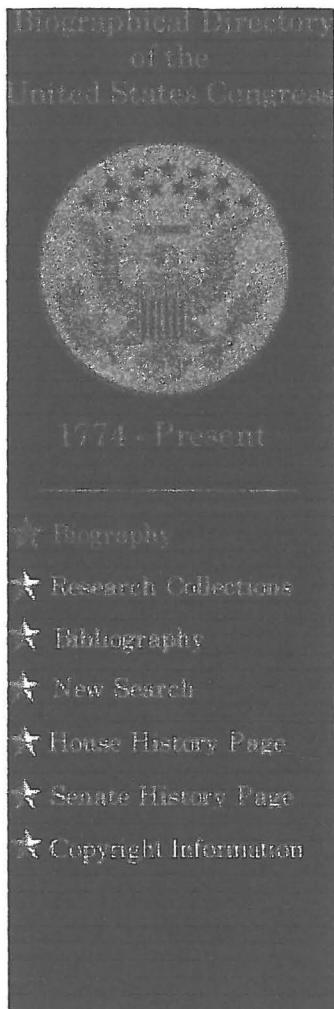
The railway superintendents of Iowa met at the Savery house Tuesday afternoon to organize a railroad club similar to that of Detroit and Chicago. There were present Superintendent C. M. Levy of the Iowa lines of the Burlington; H. C. Nutt, assistant; G. W. Fabens of the Ottumwa division; F. A. Tomey, master mechanic; Mose W. Robinson, trainmaster, Ottumwa; W. J. Calvil, roadmaster of the Burlington; W. D. Hodge, superintendent of the northern division of the North Western; E. G. Shevenell, assistant superintendent Iowa divisions of the North Western; A. P. Tanner, general superintendent M. & St. L.; C. W. Huntington, general superintendent Iowa Central; G. A. Goodrell, general superintendent Burlington, Cedar Rapids and Northern; H. B. Earling, superintendent Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul, Marion; W. J. Lawrence, superintendent of the Rock Island; H. P. Greenough, superintendent of the Rock Island and Peoria.

H. J. Slifer, superintendent of the main line division of the Northwestern, was elected president; G. A. Goodrell, general superintendent Burlington, Cedar Rapids and Northern vice president; C. M. Levy of the Burlington, second vice president; W. J. Lawrence, superintendent of the Iowa division of the Rock Island, third vice president; C. W. Huntington, general superintendent of the Iowa Central, fourth vice president; P. M. Plumb, secretary; C. P. Stemble of the Chicago Great Western, treasurer.

The organization will be known as the Iowa Railroad club, for the promotion of railroad business. After perfecting organization, adjournment was taken until April 1.

HOLMES, Adoniram Judson, 1842-1902

HOLMES, Adoniram Judson, a Representative from Iowa; born in Wooster, Wayne County, Ohio, March 2, 1842; moved with his parents to Palmyra, Wis., in 1853; attended the common schools; entered Milton College, Milton, Wis., but left in 1862 to enter the Union Army, where he served in the Twenty-fourth Regiment, Wisconsin Volunteer Infantry, until the close of the Civil War; completed his studies in Milton College and was graduated from the law department of the University of Michigan at Ann Arbor in 1867; was admitted to the bar and commenced practice in Boone, Iowa, in 1868; mayor in 1880 and 1881; member of the State house of representatives in 1882 and 1883; elected as a Republican to the Forty-eighth, Forty-ninth, and Fiftieth Congresses (March 4, 1883-March 3, 1889); unsuccessful candidate for renomination in 1888; Sergeant at Arms of the House of Representatives in the Fifty-first Congress; resumed the practice of law in Boone, Iowa; county attorney 1896-1899; died in Clarinda, Iowa, January 21, 1902; interment in Linwood Cemetery, Boone, Iowa.
