At the time of his death he was secretary of the Iowa Associtition of Mest can War Veterans, and was one of the four surviving memberselfing this city. After the war Mr. Priestley engaged in the mercantile busing it in Northumberland for some years, In 1875 he was admitter to the In 1882 he removed to Des Moines, where he has since been th the ofltee his son, the well known Dr, James T. Priestley. Mr. Priestley bade beat for years a prominent Mason.

Datho W. Jones was born in Llandisyl, Cardiganshire, Sunth Wales, September 21, 1821; he died at Manchester, Iowa, March 24, 1888 . He was
a practical machinist and manufacturer of woolen goods, having learner his father's trade before coming to this country. He crossed the Atlantlo in 1843. After residing in various places he removed to lown, setting near Manchester. in 1857. In 1865 he erected the first and ouly wooleng mill in that part of the State. This has become one of the ehief industries of Delaware county, due to the perseverance, energy, practical honwledge and skill of its proprietor. Mr. Jones not only rose to a high and nokaowe edged position as a business man, but his personal characteristios made hfin esteemed and respected wherever he was known. Mrs. Jones, alsio a nativa of South Wales, is a sister of Mrs. Owen Bromley of Des Moines. The Manchester Press of March 31 devoted several columns to an tateresting and appreciative tribute to the memory of this distinguished pioneer and most useful citizen.

Henry Mitchell McCully, representative in the 27th General Asseusbly, from Marion county, died at his home in Pella, March 8, 1895. He was born in Ohio, October 10, 1830, of Scotch-Holland descent. TVe oame to Iowa in 1857. His life has been one of great activity, and mareh of his time has been devoted to various public duties. He serted as fistloe of the peace of Lake Prairie township for several years; was major of Pella for seven terms; was a member of the board of supervisors for Marion county, and representative in the 19th and 27 th General Assemblios. In all of these positions he distinguished himself by the faithful and aipable discharge of every trust confided to him. He was in his seat a few weeks of the regular session of 1898, but his failing health at last con strained him to ask the House for "leave of absence for an indefinit period." Returning to his home he soon passed away.

Ralph Gurley Phelps, a well known lawyer of Atlantic, died Manek 10, 1898. Mr. Phelps was born in Monmouth, Illinois, January 26, 1846. He graduated with honors from Monmouth College in 1867. In 18 ts he removed to Cass county, Iowa, and the year following settled in Atlantle where he had resided thirty years. No citizen has been mose maselfishly active in promoting the welfare of the town. He was twice electod mayo In politics Mr. Phelps was a Democrat and very influential in farthering the interests of his party. His ability as an orator, and a closeand logleal thinker were widely recognized. He was a man of fine literacy tastes, a lover of books and learned in many directions. In Masonic circles he was especially esteemed and prominent, having served two years as orrand Master of the Grand Lodge of Iowa.

Mrs. Minerva C. Day, wife of Judge James G. Day, died at her home in Des Moines March 20, 1898. Minerva C. Manly was born in Olis April 3, 1836. In early life her parents removed to Allegheny City, and she re ceived her education in Pittsburg. Later, she engaged in teaching Steubenville, Ohio, and while there was united in marriage to danies $G$. Day, December 1, 1857. The young people came immediately to fowa and
