JOHN M. ST. CLAIR DIES.

Prominent Citizen of Benton County
Called By Death.

Vinton, Iowa, May 16—One who might be termed a younger pioneer of Benton county passed away at his home in Mt. Auburn, Wednesday evening at 6:30, May 14, 1913—John M. St. Clair, after a sickness covering a period of over a year.

He came to Cedar township with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Hugh St. Clair, when he was twelve years of age. He has lived in the township from that time till the day of his death. When he grew to manhood he became one of its most active citizens participating in every movement that was for the betterment of the township and the county. He served his county faithfully in the Nineteenth general assembly.

Mr. St. Clair was born in Indiana county, Pennsylvania, April 19, 1845. He came to Cedar township with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Hugh St. Clair, in 1857. December 24, 1878, he was married to Miss Sarah White, sister of Harry White of Jackson township, and Arthur White of this city. Mrs. St. Clair survives her husband together with four children, Mrs. V. M. Valgren of Chicago, Frank, Bessie and Fred. Three brothers and one sister also survive.

The last obsequies will be paid this afternoon at 2 o'clock at the home. The body will be laid to rest in the Mt. Vernon cemetery.

Mr. St. Clair's uniformly kind disposition and sterling character endeared him to a large number of friends.

The death of "Grandma Mitchell" as she has been affectionately called for many years, occurred at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Isaac Garn, early Wednesday morning. She has been frail for many years but always retained a keen and active interest in affairs, and at the end gave up her life in the same quiet, gentle way in which she had lived it. She had lived to enjoy children, grandchildren and great grandchildren, a pleasure which comparatively few are privileged to enjoy.

The family service will be held at the home this (Friday) afternoon at two o'clock, and will be conducted by Rev. W. N. Roush of the United Brethren church. Interment will be in Evergreen cemetery, beside her husband, who died twelve years ago.

Death Claims Prominent Citizen.
 John St. Clair, a prominent resident of Mt. Auburn and a member of the Nineteenth assembly of the state legislature, died Wednesday evening at the family home in that city, following an illness of several years. Paralysis was the direct cause of his death.

The funeral was held Friday afternoon from the home, Rev. Brownell of Cedar Rapids, a former pastor at Mt. Auburn, conducted the services. Interment was in the Mt. Auburn cemetery.

Mr. St. Clair was one of Cedar township's early settlers and a man

highly respected in the community. He was a member of the Nineteenth assembly of the Iowa state legislature. He was regarded as one of Benton county's very best men. A man of integrity and worth and high ideals. Mr. St. Clair was a brother-in-law of Hon. Harry White of Big Grove township and Attorney Arthur White of this city.

Obituary.
 John Mack St. Clair was born April 13, 1845, in Indiana county, Pennsylvania, his parents being Hugh and Margaret St. Clair. In the year 1866 he came to Davenport, Ia., with his parents and a year later to Benton county. He attended the Iowa state university and later read law in the office of Shane & McCartney of this city. In 1867 he was admitted to the bar and practiced law for a time. His health failed him and he was forced to live an outdoor life, taking up his residence on the farm in Cedar township, where he lived until 1899. Since that time he and his family have resided in Mt. Auburn.

Mr. St. Clair was married to Sarah White on December 27, 1877. Four children were born to this union, all of whom are living. One daughter, Mrs. V. N. Halgren, lives in Chicago and the others, Frank and Bessie are at home and Fred is deputy county clerk. Mrs. Rebecca Wallace of this city is a sister.

Mr. and Mrs. St. Clair are members of the United Presbyterian Church. In politics he is a Republican. He is at present a member of the County Board of Supervisors, and is serving his second year. He is a member of P. M. Coder Post, No. 98, G. A. R., of Vinton, and is also a member of the Benton County Veteran Association.

Mr. St. Clair settled on his farm after his marriage. In November, 1881, he moved to Mt. Auburn and engaged in the lumber and coal trade, in company with his brother Archibald. He resided in that place until 1885, when he returned to his farm, though still retaining his connection with the business.

Mr. St. Clair moved to Iowa in the fall of 1856, wintered at Davenport, and in the spring of 1857 bought his land, on section 27, Cedar Township, where he was engaged in farming until his death, which occurred Nov. 19, 1877, at his home. His wife is still living on the old homestead.

In early life Mr. St. Clair was a Whig, but became a Republican on the organization of that party. He was a member of the United Presbyterian Church. His wife, four sons and one daughter belong to the same church. The sons are all Republicans. William and Hugh were in the service—members of the 28th Iowa Infantry.

Mr. St. Clair was a robust man up to a short time before his death. He was a genial, kind-hearted neighbor, and highly respected as a citizen.

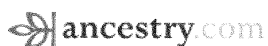
HUGH ST. CLAIR, deceased, was born in Indiana County, Pa., June 5, 1808. He was the son of Hugh and Rebecca (Beatty) St. Clair. The family were from the North of Ireland, but of Scotch descent. His parents were both of Irish birth, and emigrated to America while yet young, settling in Pennsylvania.

Hugh was reared a farmer, and when twenty-one years of age was married to Miss Margaret Mack, born in Indiana County in January, 1811, and a daughter of Robert Mack. They became the parents of ten children, two of whom died in childhood and one at the age of fourteen, and the remaining seven grew to man and womanhood. They were as follows: William M., who married Mary E. Kirkpatrick, and now lives in Cedar Township; Robert, who married Margaret Alcorn, and lives in Kearney County, Neb.; Hugh, who married Kate Brownlee, and lives in Cedar Township; Margaret, who married James R. Wallace, and died in November, 1875, leaving two children; John M., who married Sarah White, and now lives in Cedar Township; Archibald, who married Belle Wallace, and lives in Mt. Auburn, and is a lumber

ROBERT HEATH. Among the pioneers of 1854, in this county, and a gentleman who has succeeded in life through his own energy, perseverance and industry, and is yet living to tell of the trials encountered during the early settlement of the country, is the above mentioned gentleman, residing on section 3, Canton Township. He was born in Guilford County, N. C., March 18, 1816. His parents were Robert and Permelia (Perdue) Heath, who were also natives of the same State, their ancestors being among the first settlers there. In 1831 the family removed to Indiana, settling in Delaware County.

Our subject subsequently removed to Decatur County, in that State, where, in 1839, he was united in marriage with Frances Stark, a native of Kentucky. She died in 1847, leaving four children—Joseph, a resident of Polk Township; Merritt S., living in Canton Township; William R., a resident of Wilson County, Kan.; and Lovina, who married John R. Blackburn and is residing in Wilson County, Kan.

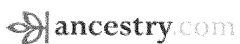

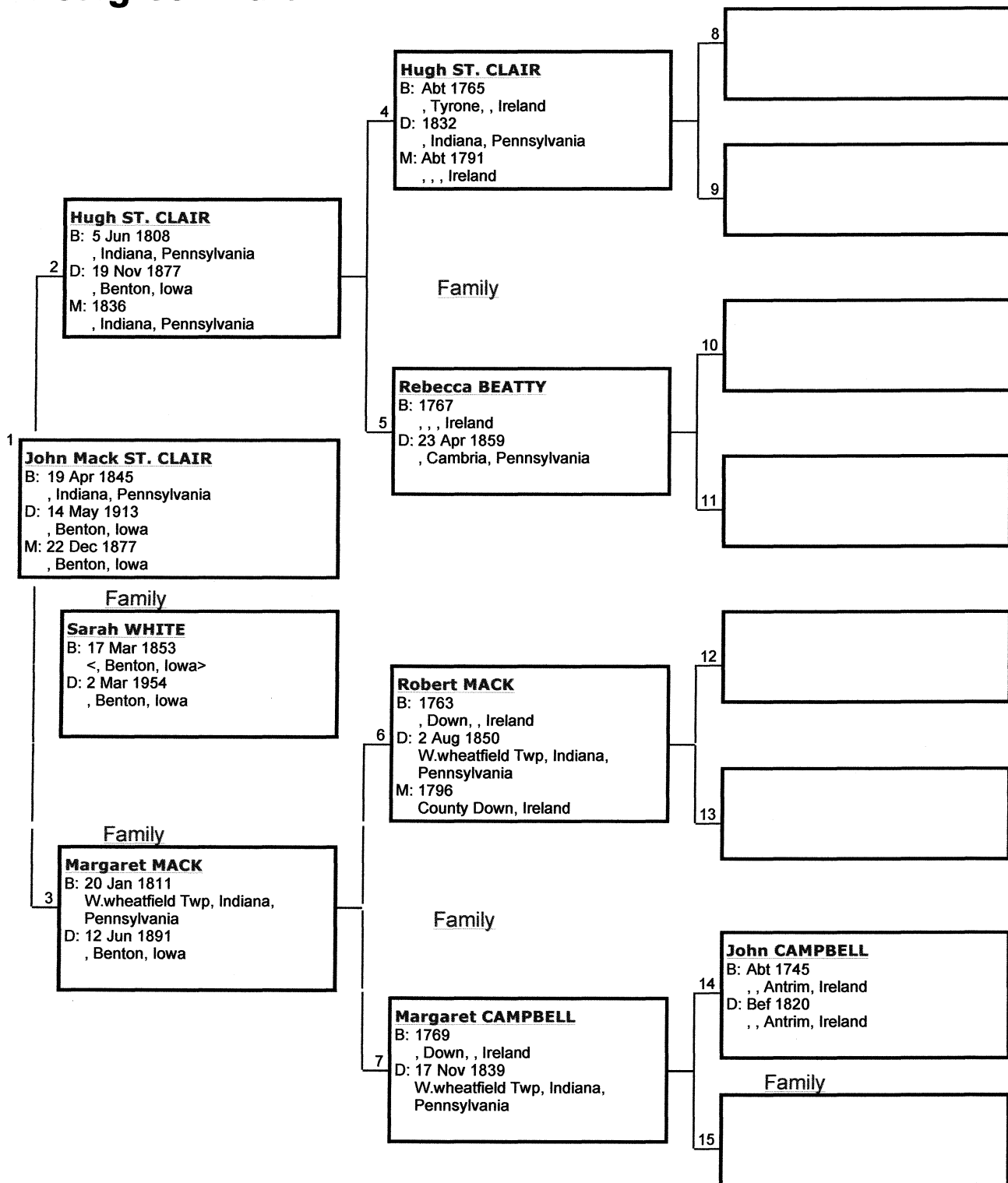
