- In 1861 he came west and located at Mitchell, Iowa in Mitchell County, Iowa
- When he returned from the Civil War he was called to be the Superintendent of the Orphan Home at Cedar Falls, Iowa. He was employed for 8 years until the home closed.
- In 1883 he went to Minnesota, locating near Kindom, Minnesota
- In 1891 he was elected as Representative from Cottonwood and Jackson Counties, Minnesota in the 27th General Assembly.
- He moved to Park Rapids, Minnesota in July 1899.

HE IS WITH THE KING.

Impressive Funeral Services of H. F. Tucker Conducted by Rev. W. T. Spriggs.

Last Sunday afternoon the funeral of H. F. Tucker was held at the Baptist church. It was a simple but impressive service—appropriate to the character of the man in whose honor his neighbors and friends had gathered to pay their last measure of love and respect.

Rev. W. T. S. Spriggs conducted the services. After a song had been sung by the choir, he read, the 103 psalm—the same psalm which at Mr. Tucker's he had read to him in his dying moments. Prayer was offered, commending the afflicted wife and daughter to the consolation and care of the Heavenly Father. In the remarks which Rev. Mr. Spriggs made he dwelt beautifully upon the value of character and alluded to the simple faith and noble unobtrusive life of Bro. Tucker. The church was his home. He knew in whom he believed. The speakers words were based upon the words found in 2 Samuel; XX: 31. "He went over Jordan with the King." Barzillai was a modest man but he was loyal to the King and when the time came he went over the Jordan with him. So, this friend whose form is looked upon for the last time was loyal to God's Kingdom. He sought no parade, no reward, but he has gone over Jordan and is with his King.

Mr. Spriggs read the following brief statement concerning the life of the deceased: "H. F. Tucker was born Sept 15, 1830 at Norton, Mass. He accepted Christ as his leader at the age of eighteen and continued firm in the faith to the end. In 1861 he sought a home in the west locating at Mitchell, Iowa, and when the call came to serve his country none responded more promptly and gladly. He was 1st lieutenant of Co. K., 27th regiment, Iowa volunteers. After about 3 years service at the front in the field another call was extended to superintend an orphans home at Cedar Falls, Iowa, for the care of the children of the heroes who had lain down their lives in the service. Here he continued for eight years or until the institution closed. This he always considered his life work.

In 1882 he served as representative from Mitchell County in the 19th General Assembly of the Iowa state legislature. In 1883 he came to Min-

At the close of the service an opportunity was given all who desired to view the face of the deceased. Brief services followed at the grave in Greenwood cemetery.

He was deeply religious in his nature and leaned implicitly upon "the everlasting arms" for salvation. Utterly free from any feeling of self righteousness he abided in the righteousness of Christ.

Mr. Spriggs emphasized several lessons from his life. He lived for the King here and when he passed over the Jordan of Death naturally went with him. He alluded to his career as a soldier and urged all his comrades who had fought under the same flag, to fight under the same King, that they too when the summons came might go over Jordan with the same supreme help.
