- He was raised on the family farm near Coshocton, Ohio until age 20 until he began to study medicine.
- After graduating from medical school he settled at Volney, Iowa about 1855, later moved to Clayton County, Iowa and moved to Harlow, Iowa about 1858.
- Military service - Civil War - Co. K, 5<sup>th</sup> Iowa Cavalry mounted in as private and marched out as Captain of Co. K, 15<sup>th</sup> Iowa Cavalry 16 Dec 1864 because of a disability
- After the war he returned to Harlow to practice medicine
- He liked to spend time and money in experimental farming
- He moved to Lattin, Nebraska in the summer of 1887
- His first wife, Julia, died in 1859
- His second wife, Marvian, died Nov 1886

### DIED.

BARNES.—At Lattin, Neb., June 2d, Dr. T. H. Barnes, aged 57 years.

Dr. Barnes was born at Coshocton, Ohio, in 1832 and was reared on a farm until he was 20 years old, when he began the study of medicine, afterwards graduating in the Medical Department of the Iowa State University. He settled at Volney about 1855, afterwards was for a short time a resident of Clayton county, and moved to Waukon about 1858. He enlisted as a private in Co. K. 5th Iowa Cavalry, April 15th, 1861, and was mustered out as Captain of Co. K, 1st Iowa Cavalry Dec. 16, 1864, on account of disability. He returned to Waukon and again entered upon his profession, in which he was very successful. He also spent time and money in experimental farming, and in 1881 built the first silo in the State of Iowa. During 1871-2-3 he was Chairman of the Board of Supervisors of Allamakee county. In 1880 he was elected as Representative from Allamakee county, the 64th District, to the State Legislature. Since that time his health has been failing, resulting in large part from injuries to the eyes received in the service of his country. He moved to Lattin, Neb., in the summer of 1887.

Dr. Barnes was married in 1854 to Miss Julia A. Orr, who died in 1859, leaving one daughter, Ida, now Mrs. L. A. Culbertson, of Ottumwa. In 1862 he married Miss Marion E. Ferris, and to them were born Callie, now Mrs. Otto Mikelson, William, and Florence. Mrs. Barnes died Nov. 1st, 1886. July 12th 1887, he married Mrs. Minerva C. Armstrong, of West Union, who survives him.

Dr. Barnes was a man of great liberality, a benefactor of the poor, and few have had more genuine friends in the county than he. He was a pioneer, a patriot, a good citizen, and will long be kindly remembered by those who knew him so many years.




