

CALDWELL

Andrew Borland Caldwell, one of
Lee county's most illustrious citizens
in years past succumbed to a linger-
ing illness Wednesday morning July
26, 1916, at 2:30 o'clock at the home
of Mr. and Mrs. R. J. Barr at Fort
Madison. The decedent represented
Lee county in the state house of re-
presentatives and was speaker of the
house for a term, making a most ac-
ceptable executive and exerting his
power with no mean hand.

Mr. Caldwell was born in West
Moorland county, Pennsylvania, and
in the year 1851 came with his par-
ents to Marion township and settled
at Clay Grove and lived there many
years. For the last thirty-five years
he has made his home with his sis-
ter, Mrs. R. J. Barr. He was always
prominent in politics until the last
few years and was ever a staunch
democrat, conscientious in the per-
forming of the duties of his office and
standing firmly for his beliefs. He
was ill for several years but during
the time of suffering he was ever
patient and never complained.

He is survived by two sisters, Mrs.
R. J. Barr of Fort Madison and Mrs.
A. J. McRacken of Gorham, Kansas;
two brothers, Joseph Caldwell of Mt.
Pleasant and Boyde-E. Caldwell of
Artusia, Calif.

The remains were brought to Clay
Grove Thursday morning where the
funeral was held at eleven o'clock
from Clay Grove church the Rev.
Lloyd Tennant officiating. Inter-
ment was in the Clay Grove ceme-
tery.
