### SUMMONED HOME.

Death After a Long Illness, of Dr. D. W. Stutsman at Bonaparte.

Into a quiet home in Bonaparte there entered, last Sunday, the angel Azrael, and whispered tenderly to the master of the household, "The Lord hath need of you." For many months, at intervals, has the shadow of his dark wing rested upon the portals of this home, as he halted on his way to and fro, in the King's service. Dr. Stutsman was a brother to Dr. S. H. and Judge Stutsman, of this city; he was born in Morgan county, Indiana, in February of the year 1838, and moved with his parents to Iowa in 1842. His boyhood and early manhood were spent upon the farm, but in the year of 1862 he went into the drug business at Bentonsport, Iowa, and the year following entered the United States service as hospital steward of the sixtieth United States colored infantry, in which place he served until the close of the war. When the war was over, he came home and began a course of study, and graduated from the medical department of the state university of Iowa in 1867, locating in Bonaparte, Van Buren county, where he has been engaged in the practice of his profession for twenty-three years. Dr. Stutsman was a man of strong and clear convictions on all questions of common interest, unwavering in politics, steadfast in friendship, a good husband, an indulgent father, and a much loved brother. He leaves a wife and a young daughter, the daughter almost grown to womanhood. His death marks the first break in a family of eight children. A host of true friends share the sorrow of the bereaved wife and child, and will long hold in fond remembrance his name and kindly quiet ways.

Eliza A., daughter of W. H. Loomis, of Seymour, Iowa, died very suddenly Wednesday evening and her remains were brought to Birmingham Friday evening for burial. Deceased was about 32 years of age, and for a number of years resided about 2 1/2 miles north of town. We learn that she retired with her sister in the evening, feeling as well as usual. Shortly she commenced vomiting and complained of smothering. A doctor was immediately summoned but before he arrived she was dead. Deceased was a niece of Mrs. William Raney, and was well known by many of our citizens.

#### Death of Dr. Stutsman.

Dr. D. W. Stutsman died at his home in Bonaparte on Sunday July 27, 1890, aged 51 years, 5 months and 15 days. His sickness was consumption with which he has been afflicted for several years, but which in its slow work left him unable to attend his practice as a physician and druggist until about a year ago, when he went west hoping for some benefit, but received it not.

Dr. Stutsman never was of a rugged constitution. The deceased was born in Morgan county, Indiana, Feb. 12, 1839. He came with his parents from there to Lee county, Iowa, in 1843 where his father died in 1845. In 1857 he went to Carlton county, Missouri, and in 1861 located in the drug business at Bentonport, commencing the study of medicine while there, and during that time was appointed commissary steward in the 69th U. S. colored regiment, which was mustered out in November 1865. Returning home he attended lectures at the Keokuk medical college and in the spring of 1867 located in the practice of medicine at Bonaparte, where he continued to reside the remainder of his life. He was married in 1876, July 3, to Miss Emma Lewis, daughter of Rev. Lewis, pastor for several years of the Presbyterian church at Bentonport and Bonaparte. In 1879 Dr. Stutsman was nominated by the Republicans and elected as representative to the legislature from Van Buren county, surviving with credit to himself and constituents. In 1884 he was the unanimous choice of the republican county convention that he should accept the nomination for supervisor, but he promptly declined. He was elected supervisor by the Democrats in the spring of 1885, but declined the position. He was elected supervisor in 1888, but declined the position.

#### Mass Indignation Meeting.

Pursuant to call about 400 citizens of Birmingham and surrounding country met in the Park last Friday evening to give expression to their feelings regarding the "original package" house which has recently been established in our town.

The meeting was organized by electing Rev. Corkhill chairman and W. J. Eulow secretary. After the singing of two hymns by a volunteer glee club, Rev. Rubardt offered prayer. Rev. Corkhill stated the object of the meeting and gave his views of the question under consideration in plain words.

A set of resolutions was then read and a motion made for their adoption. Each resolution to be read and discussed separately. We have not been furnished a copy of the resolutions, therefore cannot publish them. But the sentiments expressed were about as follows: The first was a polite request for the proprietor of the original package house and his clerk to quit the business and remove his goods from our midst. The second was in effect that we do not believe the decision of the Federal supreme court in the case of Leisy vs. Hardin, gives the right to open the case, remove the bottles therefrom and sell them separately; that it is a violation of law to do so. The third gave the parties to understand that if they did not comply with the demands of the meeting, they would be proceeded against and all lawful means used to rid the town of their business.

Short speeches were made by Rev. Corkhill and Rubardt, and Messrs. Wolf, Eulow, Boon, Filson, Porter, Zies and others. A majority of the speakers were very guarded in their remarks, and while determined to do all in their power to rid the community of the nuisance, with two exceptions were conservatives. 



The death of Dr. D. N. Stutsman has been expected for some time, yet it was a shock. Genuine sorrow and regret was manifested by all in this vicinity when they learned of his demise which occurred at his home in this city last Sunday, (27 Jul 1890) of consumption, in his 52nd year, after an illness of ten months. Dr. Stutsman was born in Morgan Co., Ind., Feb. 12, 1839. He came to Lee Co., in 1843, to Chariton Co., Mo., in 1864, to Bentonsport in 1864 where he engaged in the drug business and while there commenced his life study of medicine. In 1865 he was appointed commissary steward in the 60th U.S. Colored regiment, discharged in November of the same year. After this he attended a course of lectures at the College of Physicians at Keokuk, graduating in the spring of 1867 with high honors, after which he started his practice in Bonaparte, his home since then, and Bonaparte people can tell of many sufferings he has relieved, being one of the ablest physicians in this section of Iowa. He married Miss Emma Lewis, July 3, 1873, to whom two daughters were born. His wife and one daughter, Xantippe are left to mourn the loss of a noble husband and father. The two brothers of the deceased Dr. and Judge Stutsman of Burlington and sister were present at the funeral which was conducted at the home Tuesday at 3 P.M. By Rev. Poole of Bentonsport. Dr. Stutsman enjoyed the confidence, respect and love of the entire community and was an honored member of the Masonic order in the degree of Knights Templar. Large delegations from Farmington, Keosauqua and Bentonsport attended the funeral and with the home members, laid their brother to rest with due honor and ceremony. Among the Sir Knights from a distance that were noticed in the procession were, Messrs. Walker, Wilkenson, Sloan, Brown, Miller, and Johnson of Keosauqua; Messrs. Grubb, Goodin, Turton, Carroll, Neff, Burg, and Beeson from Farmington; Those of the Blue Lodge of Farmington were, Messrs. Carr, Therme, Cooley, Leech, Farris, French, Scott, Spurrier, Lapsley, Townsend, Hassler and Miller.




