years as a member of the board of commissioners for Jones county, Iowa, and for two successive terms as a member of the state legislature.

In 1883 Mr. Yoran came to the Pacific coast and settled in Eugene where he engaged first in the warehouse business for two years, and afterward established, in partnership with J. M. Hodson, the Eugene Register. He later engaged in the retail shoe business until he retired from active business several years ago.

Father of Five Children

In Herkimer county, N. Y., in 1859,

Miss Maria Markell, also a native of that locality, became the wife of Mr. Yoran and five children were born to them, all of whom survive him with the exception of Elizabeth Yoran, who died in 1914. The surviving sons and daughter are: Colonel George O. Yoran, William C. Yoran, Darwin E. Yoran and Mrs. C. A. E. Whitten, all of this city. Mrs. Yoran died November 9, last year.

By political affiliations deceased was a republican.

Mr. Yoran took an active interest in western progress, both municipal and state and had been identified with practically every move for civic improvement in Eugene. In 1896 he was on the republican ticket as presidential elector and was elected.

Was Prominent Mason.

In his fraternal relations Mr. Yoran was one of the most prominent Masons in the state, having been made a member in Monticello Lodge No. 173 and then Eugene Lodge No. 11, of which he is a past master. He was made a Royal Arch Mason in Monticello and held membership in Eugene chapter No. 10 in which he was a past priest. He was also a past high priest of Grand Chapter R. A. M. The late meeting of the grand lodge in Portland was the first meeting of the order that Mr. Yoran had missed in 30 years. He was made a Knight Templar in Monticello Commandery No. 16, K. T., and there past excellent commander and was at the time of his death past commander in Ivanhoe Commandery No. 2. In 1822 he was grand commander of the Grand Commandery of Oregon, and belonged to the order of the High Priesthood. In June, 1903, he was elected as grand master of the Grand Lodge of Oregon at the annual meeting of the Grand Lodge at Portland.

The governor had refused all appeals of physicians to sleep, and also refused to touch food. He sat up all night and broken at her bedside.

"Saturday was the happiest day of my life," the governor said.

The Smalls were acclaimed by thousands of people in Kankakee on their return from the trial Saturday night. Mrs. Small had lived in Kankakee since their marriage in 1892. Mrs. Small was a native of Illinois, having been born in Livingston county in 1861. She was the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Moore. As the first lady of the state, she was a popular leader with innumerable friends in all parts of Illinois.

She had been closely associated with her husband's political and business success. He often attributed a large part of his success to her advice and counsel.

PRINCE OF MONACO DIES AT AGE OF 74

Paris, June 26.—The prince of Monaco died today following an operation.

Albert Honoré Charles, ruler of the principality of Monaco, was distinguished as an explorer and scientist and his museum on the promontory overlooking the famous gambling casino of Monte Carlo, was perhaps the best in the world.

Subjects of Monaco were devoted to their prince who in his turn devoted his resources to the welfare of his little possession. There are no taxes to pay in Monaco, proceeds from the gambling casinos of Monte Carlo furnishing all the funds necessary for the running and maintaining of the little principality.

The grand lodge furnished all the honorary pall bearers, and the local lodge the active pall bearers. That the deceased was held in high regard by his fraternal brothers was proven when the largest body of Masons said ever to have attended a funeral of a brother came out to pay his memory a last tribute.

Rev. W. H. L. Marshal of the Congregational church, delivered the sermon. Interment was made in Hope Abbey mausoleum.

Hon. Silas M. Yoran, a former resident of the Bowen's Prairie region of Lovell township, died at his home in Eugene, Oregon, Saturday, June 24, following a stroke of paralysis he sustained the previous Sunday, at the age of 87 years. Mr. Yoran while a resident of Jones county served in the 17th and 18th General Assemblies of Iowa. He was intellectually strong, and took an ardent interest in republican politics while a resident of Iowa. His first vote was cast for John C. Fremont. He had an interesting and congenial family, and his home on Bowen's Prairie was the scene of many happy gatherings, where many Monticello people were welcomed guests. Silas M. Yoran was born in New York state, January 26, 1835, of colonial ancestry who came mostly from Holland. He was married July 12, 1859, to Maria Markell, also of New York state, who preceded him in death by only a few months, November 9, 1921. He came to Iowa in 1853, joining his sister, Mrs. Asa C. Bowen, who had come here two years earlier, and had an active part in the early life of the community around Sand Spring and Bowen's Prairie. In the early eighties the family removed to Eugene, Oregon, which had since been their home and where the four children are—George, William, Darwin and Mrs. Louise C. Whitton. Out of the family of nine children one brother and one sister remain: Mrs. Katherine Garlock of Ballston Lake, New York, and Calvin Yoran of Manchester. Mr. Yoran was greatly interested in Masonry and had received high honors in that fraternity in Oregon.

The Scourge Of The Carnival.

Cherokee Chief: The traveling carnival might well be likened to a scourge of grasshoppers, dropping in on us for a short time and leaving us much the worse for their visit. They swung into a driveway, turned around and headed back toward town, no doubt with the idea of making their getaway before the sheriff's car could be turned to follow them. The sheriff and Hawkes left their car and stood in the road, with leveled guns, and ordered the oncoming car to stop. It was 6:30 o'clock, with a bright sun shining, but Stewart, who was at the wheel and knows Pride well, speeded up his car with the evident intention of running down the sheriff if he didn't get out of the way.

Leaping on the running boards of the fleeing car, the sheriff and his deputy ordered the driver to stop the machine. Pride was in a perilous position, half dragging under the car, with insecure footing, and he had to act quickly. Seeing that Stewart was determined to shake him off, the sheriff let him have it in the left shoulder, upon which Stewart collapsed at the wheel and the car was stopped. The wounded man was taken to a local physician and the bullet extracted. Hearing was had at once before Justice Pentony and both men released under heavy bond. They will be given their trial before Judge E. B. Stiles, next Monday.

Both Stewart and Miller are said to reside in Rock Island, and have been frequent visitors here. Their impudent attempt to resist arrest is an indication of the contempt for law which prevails so generally among offenders of their type. Perhaps booze vendors who are in the habit of cultivating Delaware county territory will take a hint from this affair and stop when an officer bids them to. Sheriff Pride did just the right thing, and is to be commended for inculcating a lesson that needs to be impressed upon the minds of law breakers.

He has held the offices of Town Clerk, City Recorder and is now a member of the School Board. He married Miss Ellen M. Dewey, daughter of D. S. Dewey, an old and honored settler of Jones Co.; they have two children—one daughter, Kittie May, and one son, Harry.

JAMES YOUNG, wagon and carriage maker, Monticello; is a native of Scotland, and was born July 29, 1838; when 17 years of age, he came to Canada, where he learned the business of carriage and wagon making; in 1860, he came to the United States; he came west to Iowa and located at Anamosa in February, 1865; he came to Monticello the same year, and since then has carried on his business here. He married Miss Margaret Rhea, a native of Scotland, Jan. 22, 1867; they have four children—James, Ellen, Henry and Margaret.

PETER YOUNG, blacksmith, Monticello; is a native of Scotland, and was born Sept. 14, 1840; he came to Canada when 15 years of age, in 1855; he learned the trade of blacksmith; in 1865, he came to Jones Co., Iowa, and located at Anamosa; he remained there over two years, and, in 1867, came to Monticello, and since then he has been engaged in business here. In the fall of 1877, Mr. Yoran was elected to the General Assembly of Iowa; was re-elected in the fall of 1879; he was a member of the Board of Supervisors for the years 1868-73. He was married to Maria L. Markell, of Herkimer Co., N. Y.; they have five children—Libbie, George, William, Darwin and Louise.

Made a royal arch mason in Monticello and past high priest in Eugene #10. Made a Knight Templar in Monticello Commandery #16, K.T. Now a past commander in Ivanhoe Commandery #2. In 1893 he was grand commander of the Grand Commandery of Oregon and belonged to order of High Priesthood. In June 1903, he was elected grand master of the Grand Lodge of Oregon.
