Hon．Sllas M．Yoran，a Pormer resl－ dent of the Bowen＇s Prairle region of Lovell township，died at his home in Eugene，Oregon，．Saturday，Juné 24， following a stroke of paralysis he sub－ tained the previous Sundas，at the age of 87 years．Mr．Yoran while a resi－ dent of Jones county served in the 17th and 18th General Assemblles of Iowa． He was intellectually strong．and took an ardent interest in republican poll－ tics while a resident of Iowa．His first vote was cast for John C．Fre－ mont．He had an interesting and con－ genial family，and his home on Bow－ en＇s Prairle was the scene of many happy gntherings，where many Mon－ ticello people were welcomed guests． Sllas M．Yoran was born in New York state，January 26，1835，of colonial an－ cestry who came mostly from Holland． Hc was marriod July 19，1959，©o Marla Merivel，atso－of－Niew－Fork－state，who

In the fall of $1877, \mathrm{Mr}$. Yoran was elected to the General Assembly of Iowa; was re-elected in the fall of 1879 ; he was a member of the Board of Supervisors for the years 1868-73. He was married to Maria L. Markell, of Herkimer Co., N. Y.; they have five children-Libbie, George, William, Darwin and Louise.
