YANK CITIZEN EXPELLED FROM SOVIET RUSSIA

London, Feb. 9.—A Reuter's dispatch from Riga, Latvia, says that Aaron Kopman, an American citizen, was expelled from soviet Russia yesterday by the state police after 15 months' imprisonment. Kopman, in telling of his imprisonment, described "incredible" cruelties by the soviet wardens in the Visseria prison camp in the province of Perm.

The dispatches quoted Kopman as saying that he went to soviet Russia in 1924, as a representative of various New York companies and found business impossible. Then he was suddenly arrested, he said, for violation of the state monopoly and was sentenced to three years' imprisonment in a concentration camp from which he believes he was released before the termination of his sentence because of the efforts of American firms.

BOOM IN WALL STREET RAILWAY STOCKS SMASHED

New York, Feb. 9.—(AP)—The corner in the common stock of the Wheeling and Lake Erie railroad appeared to have been smashed on the New York stock exchange today when increased offerings of the stock sent the price tumbling from \$105 to \$66.75 a share, but it snapped back to \$95 on belated short coverings and then eased to \$90.

Meanwhile, speculative balloons in other rails, inflated by wild rumors of mergers and competitive bidding for control, were punctured in rapid succession, sending about a dozen issues 5 to 15 points below the high levels established in the first hour of trading.

PIONEER S. C. MAN IS DEAD

J. H. Bolton Dies After Bronchial Trouble Develops.

Death Friday night claimed James H. Bolton, pioneer Sioux City attorney and business man, after he had been confined to his home at 807 Eighth street several weeks with bronchial trouble. He died at 10 p. m.

Mr. Bolton had been a resident of Sioux City 57 years, and for 44 years was deputy clerk of federal court. He was prominent in business, political and religious circles during his life here, and few could number as many friends as the veteran deputy clerk, who was engaged actively in his work until the time of his death.

"I stick to my job because I like it," Mr. Bolton often declared when asked why he continued plugging away, day after day and year after year, when most men of his years and means were retiring from business cares to go to sunnier climates.

Mr. Bolton was born January 26, 1846, in Cleveland, O. He was the son of Judge Thomas Bolton, of that city. In 1866 he was graduated from Western Reserve college, of Cleveland. He then took his bachelor of law degree at Harvard, graduating from that college in 1869.

In June of the same year he came to Sioux City, and practiced law until 1876. He then was elected to a 2-year term in the state legislature.

Clerk of District Court.

In 1880, Mr. Bolton was elected clerk of the district court, and held that office until he refused to run again for re-election. In 1882 he was appointed by Judge Oliver P. Shiras to the office of deputy clerk. Judge Shiras was the first federal judge the northern district of Iowa ever had.

The deputy was reappointed by Judge Henry T. Reed and Judge George C. Scott, when those judges took positions on the federal bench.

In February, 1882, Mr. Bolton married Miss Minnie A. Cornish, daughter of William Cornish, of Elkhart, Ind., and she survived him.

Mr. Bolton has been interested in many business enterprises in Sioux

He notified William Frank Dugan, author and producer, to prepare for arrest after the show with seven members of the company.

Arraigned in Night Court.

There was a flurry among the actors when the word spread behind the scenes of "The Virgin Man," but it did not seem to surprise many of them. Dorothy Hall, one of the stars had reported ill before the first curtain, but so had her understudy. Miss Hall was compelled to be there after all and was told she must go to the West Side court, together with Joseph Baird, Betty Alden, Edna Clare, Charles Horn, Virginia Smith and Don Dillaway.

The manager and cast of "The Captive" were the first to arrive in night court where Magistrate Flood and Acting Mayor McKee were awaiting them. Mr. McKee, who gave his approval for the night's procedure, discussed the case with the lawyers for the three groups of prisoners and made arrangements for bail.

The three plays which were the occasion of the arrests tonight dealt with the following subjects in a manner which the prosecution regarded as "indecent."

"The Captive," translated from the French of Edouard Bourdet by Arthur Hornblow, Jr., represents a woman as the emotional captive of another vainly trying to escape by marriage. It is the first time such a relationship has been treated on the American stage.

"Sex," credited on the program to Jane Mair, but attributed to Max West who stars in it, is a play of dissolute women following the footsteps in their husbands' tracks.

He was for a long time member of the bar association of Iowa.

Mr. Bolton is survived by his widow, two sons, Tom C. and James C., both of Sloux City; one brother, C. C. Bolton, of Cleveland, O., and three grandchildren.

VETERAN CLERK U. S. COURT DIES

J. H. Bolton Spent 50 Years of Life in Public Service

J. H. Bolton, 81 years old, pioneer of northwest Iowa and deputy clerk of federal court here, died in his home, 807 Eighth street, late Wednesday night.

Mr. Bolton had been critically ill for several weeks.

Mr. Bolton had lived in Sioux City for 57 years, coming here in 1859 after he was graduated from the Harvard law school. He was among Sioux City's best known pioneers.

Deserting his chosen profession for a career as a public servant when he was 31 years old, he spent 50 years—the last half century of his life—in state and government offices. He was deputy clerk of federal court

in charge of the federal clerk's office here for more than 42 years, holding the office from the time of its establishment here in September 1882, until his death.

Mr. Bolton was born at Cleveland, Ohio, January 20, 1846, and was the son of Thomas Bolton, an Ohio judge. He attended grammar and high school at Cleveland and after graduating from high school matriculated at Western Reserve college, which now is Adelbert college, a part of Western Reserve university, of Cleveland. Graduating from that institution in 1868, he entered Harvard the following fall and three years later received a degree of bachelor of laws.

Legislator in '77

Immediately after his graduation Mr. Bolton came to Sioux City and began practicing law. He was an active member of the bar until 1876. In that year he left his profession and turned his attention to politics. Meanwhile he made real estate investments in what then were outlying sections of the town.

His first election to a public office was in 1877, when he was chosen state representative. In 1879 he declined to run for legislature again, and announced his candidacy for clerk of district court on the republican ticket. The following year he

was elected, and upon completion of a two-year term he was re-elected for a six-year term.

Gaining friends in the republican party Mr. Bolton's popularity grew so that in September, 1882, when offices of the federal court were opened here he was tendered the office of deputy clerk of court. The appointment was made by the late Federal Judge Shiras, who then was judge in the western division of the northern district of Iowa.

Mr. Bolton, in 1896, was appointed custodian of the federal building and surveyor of customs for the port of Sioux City, President McKinley making the appointment. His appointment was renewed in 1902, after Theodore Roosevelt assumed the presidency.

Meanwhile, Mr. Bolton, became identified with various Sioux City financial enterprises, with his real estate investments bearing good returns. In 1892 he was made a director in the Security National bank, and still held that office at the time of his death. He also built a downtown office building, the Bolton block, at 604 Fourth street, in 1890. It was destroyed by fire in 1914 and has been replaced by the Brown block. Until recently he was president of the Anderson Furniture company, but retired in favor of his youngest son, James Bolton, who now is vice president of the company.

Prominent in civic and social life, for many years, Mr. Bolton belonged to Tyrian lodge, No. 508, A. F. and A. M., Knights Templar, and Abubekr temple, the Elks and the Sioux City Country club. He also was a member of the Hawkeye club, an organization of pioneers.

Until his death Mr. Bolton was the oldest living vestryman of St. Thomas Episcopal church. He was a vestryman for nearly 45 years, and was senior warden for 25 years.

Mr. Bolton was married to Miss Minnie Cornish, a daughter of William Cornish, of Elkhart, Ind., and a sister of Mrs. Will H. Beck, the widow of Sioux City's well known pioneer jeweler.

Mr. Bolton is survived by his widow, Mrs. Minnie A. Bolton; two sons, James C. Bolton, of the Anderson Furniture company and Tom C. Bolton, of Davidson Brothers company; one brother, C. C. Bolton, of Cleveland, Ohio, and three grandchildren.

The body is in West's Funeral Home pending arrangements for the funeral which probably will be Saturday afternoon.
