Funeral of Hon. R. W. Duncan.

The funeral services of this well
known and much esteemed citizen,
whose death occurred last Sunday night,
took place at his late residence on
Tuesday afternoon, Rev. W. J. Hastle
pastor of the Christian church, of
which the deceased was a prominent
member, preached the funeral dis-
course, and appropriate music was

rendered by the church choir. The re-
mains were followed to the grave by a
very large concourse of his friends re-
siding in all parts of the county. The
K of P organization of Albia attended
in a body. Mrs. D. and his sons re-
ceived a large number of telegrams ex-
pressing the condolence of the senders
over the loss of so good a father, hus-
band and citizen.

Mr. Duncan was born in Lordstown,
Ohio, on Jan. 13th, 1836. He was
married to Miss Laura E. Jones in
October, 1860, and to them was born
three sons, Mark, Ward and Delbert,
all residents of Albia. Came to Albia
in Dec. 1867. His wife died Sept. 15,
1887. He was married to Mrs. Mary
Ury, Nov. 26, 1889, who, with the chil-
dren, mourn the loss of a kind and lov-
ing father and husband.

Mr. Duncan was elected to the 17th
session of the Iowa legislature. For
a great many years he was president
of the Albia school board. In all mat-
ters pertaining to the promotion of
the towns interests he did his full
part. By virtue of his moral worth,
many character, and genial disposi-
tion he acquired friends among all
classes, and his death will be deeply
deplored.
