- In the 1870's for 3 years he was associated with the newspaper named The Eddyville Advance. He was an editor
- In 1880 he and his wife moved to Ottumwa, Iowa and not long after they moved to Sedalia, Missouri. There he practiced law
- For years he was also pension agent for the old Civil War soldiers living in Sedalia and surrounding areas.
- His wife, Margart, died 1 Aug 1897.
- He lived alone after her death in Sedalia across the street from his daughter, Mrs. Jarnes
- He died in Mansfield, Ohio of appendicitis where he had gone for a Fast family reunion at Orange, Ohio

Death of W. A. Fast

We are informed of the death of W. A. Fast, years ago a resident of this place and publisher of the Eddyville Advance during the '70's, but of late years of Sedalia, Missouri, where he was engaged in the practice of law. His death occurred at Mansfield, Ohio, on Friday, June 21, 1910. He was at that place attending a family reunion when he was taken ill with appendicitis. Mr. Fast was a son-in-law of Mrs. C. Cooper, of this place, and will be pleasantly remembered by many of the older residents of the town. His funeral was conducted at his home at Sedalia last Sunday. Obituary of Wilson A. Fast

The Tribune last week contained a brief mention only of the death of one of Eddyville's early business men, W. A. Fast.

Wilson A. Fast was born at Ashland, Ohio, about 1842. Selecting law as his vocation, he attended college, after completing the course in the grammar school in his native town, in Oberlin, Ohio, and also in England. In 1872 he located in Eddyville and practiced law; for a time being associated with Attorney D. M. Conley, under the firm name of Fast & Conley. For a period of about three years during the '70's he was connected with one of Eddyville's early newspapers, The Advance. A copy of The Advance of February 17, 1875, on file in The Tribune city editor's office, shows that it was conducted by John T. Sherman, with W. A. Fast as editor. Mr. Fast was identified with politics to some extent while here, serving in the seventeenth general assembly of the legislature in 1878, but was beaten in the race for the second term in 1879.

In 1874 he was married to Maggie Cooper, daughter of Robert Cooper (now deceased) and Mrs. Catherine Cooper, who still resides here. Mr. and Mrs. Fast were the parents of three children, Mrs. I. D. Turner, of Sedalia, Missouri; J. C. Fast, of Muskogee, Oklahoma, and Carl Fast, of Montana. He is also survived by one brother and two sisters.

Sedalia, Missouri, where he has since practiced law. For years he was also pension agent for the old soldiers in Sedalia and surrounding country.

At the time of his death he was past commander and adjutant general of Post No. 53 of the G. A. R., and was frequently an interested visitor and delegate to state and national encampments of that organization. He was for years a stalwart worker in the Republican party, though he had held no office since he had lived in Sedalia.

His wife preceeded him in death on August 1, 1897, and he has since lived alone, occupying the old home directly across the street from his daughter, Mrs. Turner.

On June 3rd he left Sedalia for Orange, Ohio, to attend a family reunion, at which between 200 and 300 members of the Fast family were present. While there he was suddenly taken ill with appendicitis, and on June 16 he was placed in a hospital in Mansfield, Ohio, and a surgical operation was performed but his condition continued critical till death relieved his sufferings on Friday morning, June 24, 1910. He was 68 years of age at the time of his death.

The remains were brought back to Sedalia, and the funenal services were conducted at the home of his son-in-law on Sunday afternoon, June 26, by Rev. Douglass M. Atwill, rector of Calvary Parish, and burial was made in Crown Hill cemetery at Sedalia, under the auspices of the G. A. R. Post.

That Mr. Fast was as highly esteemed in Sedalia as at Eddyville, is attested by the fact that the Pettis County Bar Association held two separate meetings, at one of which arrangements were made for the funeral, while at the other a set of resolutions were drafted in memory of the honored dead.
