JOHN HERON DEAD RITES TOMORROW

**Old Settler And Old Soldier
Died At His Home In
Lockridge Yesterday**

John Heron, member of a pioneer
Jefferson county family, an old sol-
dier and a leading citizen of his
community, died yesterday afternoon
at 1 o'clock at his home in Lock-
ridge. He had been in feeble health
for some months and only last
spring moved from the old home-
stead, a half-mile north of Lockridge
to a little home in that town where
he lived with his sister, Miss Jessie
Heron.

Funeral services will be held to-
morrow morning at 10 o'clock at the
Lockridge Baptist church and will
be in charge of Rev. E. C. Vander-
pool. Interment will be in the Lock-
ridge cemetery.

Mr. Heron was born in Clinton
county, Pa., Oct. 24, 1840 and came to
this county with the family in the
spring of 1857. He enlisted in Com-
pany E, Second Iowa Infantry and
served with distinction in that regi-
ment, which was the first to leave
the county for the war. He was in
the battles of Ft. Donelson, Pitts-
burg Landing, Corinth, Atlanta and
others.

He was a leader in his community
and served the county as representa-
tive in the legislature of 1878. He
was the captain of the Lockridge
militia company, after the war, and
was a prominent member of the Bap-
tist church and the republican party.
He was never married.

Among the out of town people here
for the funeral are his nephew and
niece, Judge H. H. Carter and Miss
Theresa Carter of Corydon.

NEWSPAPER VETERANS TO BE PENSIONED

SANTIAGO, Chile, Aug. 27 (U. P.)
—Twenty years of service
for journalistic work is to be rewar-
ded by pension under a new law just
enacted by decree, entitled the
"Newspaper Employees' and Journalists' Pen-
sion Law."

The beneficiaries under the sec-
tion of the law providing for journal-
ists include all classes of employees,
periodicals from daily newspapers
monthly publications, and cor-
respondents, messengers, porters, ad-
vertising men, business office help,
members of the editorial and news
staffs.

Funds to provide for the pens-
ions are gathered from many sources,
mainly the deposit of five percent
of each employee's salary, an equal
sum deposited by the employer.

FIND TWO WITH BULLETS IN HEADS

**Apparently Pair In Chicago
Had Been Murdered And
Thrown From Auto**

CHICAGO, Aug. 28 (United Press)
—Bodies of two unidentified men
with bullet holes in their heads were
found today on a lonely road on the
southwest side near Ashburn field.

Apparently they were murdered
and thrown from an automobile. A
suitcase containing an aviator's per-
sonal effects was found with them but
no one from the nearby field said they
were not aviators.

The only marks of identification
were an "H" on the belt buckle of
one and an "S" in the coat of the
other. Both were middle aged and
apparently Americans.

Police believe the double murder
is another outcropping of the bootleg-
war.

OBITUARY

JOHN HERON

John Heron was born in Clinton
 county, Penn., on October 24, 1840,
 and died at Lockridge, Ia., Aug. 27,
 1925, aged 84 years, 10 months and 3
 days. His parents were David and Ja-
 net Heron who came to America from
 Scotland. He was one of seven chil-
 dren, all of whom preceded him in
 death, except his sister Theresa who
 alone survives. The other children
 were David, Agnes, Elizabeth, Mary,
 Deborah. Besides his sister he leaves
 to mourn his departure, five nieces
 and two nephews, as follows: Mrs.
 Yettie Harris and Mrs. Mary Broad-
 field of Manlius, New York; Mrs. Car-
 rie Griswold of Seattle, Wash.; Mrs.
 Alice Covell of Los Angeles, Cal., and
 Miss Jessie Carter of Corydon, Ia.
 The two nephews are Justin Bovee of
 Seattle, Wash., and Horace H. Car-
 ter of Corydon, Ia. In 1857, when he
 was 17 years old, the family moved to
 Jefferson county, Iowa, settling on a

farm one-half north of Lockridge,
 where he continued to reside with his
 sister until about April 1, 1925, when
 they moved to Lockridge.

He had been in failing health for
 several months. But until a few
 months ago, he retained his mental
 vigor to a remarkable degree.

In the fall of 1861, he enlisted in
 Company E of the 2nd Iowa Vol. In-
 fantry, serving three years in the
 Civil war. He served one term in the
 Iowa legislature as a member of the
 House of Representatives from
 Jefferson county.

He was a member of Baptist church
 of Lockridge and for several years
 held several of the official positions
 in the church. He was a man of
 strictest integrity whose word was
 never doubted. He was universally
 respected and was always on the
 right side of all moral questions. His
 notions were always worthy and he
 never intentionally did anyone wrong.
 He was interested in all good things
 and was glad when success crowned
 worthy efforts. He was one of the
 real strong men of the county for
 half a century and his passing will
 be a distinct loss to the community
 in which he so long and so worthily
 lived.

Funeral services were held at the
 Lockridge Baptist church Saturday
 morning at ten o'clock, Aug. 29th,
 conducted by Rev. E. C. Vanderpool.
 Interment was in Lockridge ceme-
 tery. The choir sang very beautiful-
 ly "Rock of Ages," "Sweet Hour of
 Prayer," "Shall We Meet Beyond the
 River." The pall bearers were Gus
 Schillerstrom, William Swanson, Har-
 old Berg, Harry Cody, Victor John-
 son, C. F. Erickson.
