J. M. KOPP, FORMER RESIDENT OF
THIS COUNTY, PASSED AWAY.

Was Veteran of the Civil War and Set-
tled in This County at Close
of the Hostilities.

Mr. J. M. Kopp, who for many years was a citizen of Des Moines county, Iowa, died at 5 a. m. at Kansas City, Mo., on March 2, 1915. He was born in Wuertemberg, Germany, September 8, 1836, and thus was in his 79th year at the time of his death. As a small boy he came to this country with his parents. The family settled in Wisconsin, which was then almost an unbroken wilderness. The labor which it took to fell the forests, and thus make the land tillable, is beyond calculation and belief. On October 2, 1859, he married Mary Wagner, and together they laid the foundation for a home. Then the war came and he enlisted for the union. He was at Franklin, Nashville and other battles. After the war they removed to Des Moines county, Iowa, settling on what was then known as the Cameron farm in Franklin township. On this farm he lived until the spring of 1897, when they retired from active life. Mr. and Mrs. Kopp were privileged to live together for nearly fifty-four years, she passing away on September 24, 1913. Since her death he

From boyhood Mr. Kopp was an earnest member of the Methodist church. He had strong religious convictions. In politics he was always a republican, having cast his first presidential vote for Abraham Lincoln. In his earlier years he was somewhat active in party affairs. He was frequently chosen to fill the various township offices, and in 1877 was elected representative from Des Moines county on the republican ticket. All positions to which he was chosen he filled with ability and fidelity. He was widely known for his upright character. His opportunity to attend school was very limited—only a single term in a pioneer log school house—but by his own efforts he acquired a liberal education.

Marvelous have been the changes in his lifetime. When he was born the upper part of the Mississippi valley had scarcely been touched. Now it is an empire in itself. Then, scarcely any of the modern inventions were known. Now they are all part of every-day life. It is hardly conceivable that any future generation will see such transformations.

He is survived by five children, Charles Kopp, who lives on the home place, and Mrs. Lillie Heuer of this county, Mrs. Anna Kaltenbach of

Kansas City, and W. F. Kopp and John F. Kopp of Mt. Pleasant. The funeral will occur Thursday afternoon, March 4th. Prayer will be offered at the old home and the funeral will be held at the Kline, M. E. church at 1:30 p. m. Interment will take place in the cemetery at the old Stone church, where so many early settlers are sleeping the great sleep of death.

He will be deeply mourned not only by the family, but by all who knew him.
