HON. J. K. MAYNARD DIES AT JANESVILLE

Prominent Iowa Politician For
Many Years and a State
Legislator.

LONG RESIDENT OF IOWA

Settled In Bremer County In 1856
—Postmaster at Waverly
Ten Years.

Janesville, Ia., April 9.—(Special.)—Hon. J. K. Maynard died today at his home in Janesville of a complication of diseases. Mr. Maynard settled in Bremer county in 1856. For years he was prominent in Iowa politics and was a member of the state legislature, and postmaster at Waverly from 1862 to 1872. He was 73 years old. He is survived by three sons, Rev. O. K. Maynard of Sioux City, J. B. Maynard and A. A. Maynard of Janesville, and one daughter, Mrs. Burman, also of Janesville.

COLLEGE CONFERENCE.

Fifteen Schools Represented at Congrega-
tional Meeting at Grinnell.

Grinnell, Ia., April 9.—(Special.)—The first annual conference of the Congregational colleges situated in the states lying between the Allegheny and Rocky mountains closed a two days' session last evening. This conference grew out of a movement started last October at the time of the inauguration of President George of the Chicago Theological seminary. A committee consisting of Presidents Eaton of Beloit, Fuller of Drury, Bradley of Iowa, and McClelland of Knox was appointed to call a conference of colleges and prepare a programme for its sessions. It was decided to hold the conference in Grinnell and nineteen colleges were invited to be represented each by two members of the faculty.

Fifteen institutions responded and took part in the conference that has set a high standard for those that follow. Four general subjects were considered in the discussions: "Relative Values in Educational Subjects," "Religion as Central in Education," "Leadership of Colleges" and "The College and the Ministry."

The position of the American college and its special work was rightly maintained. It was held that nothing short of a full four years' course will be adequate for the work of the college and no concession was made to the demand to shorten the course. The best professional schools demand a full four years' course and the western college is determined to maintain the equality of the college was emphasized and the importance of this work in furnishing to the west Christian leaders.

SHOT FORMER LOVER WHILE HE SLEPT

Mrs. Amanda Williams Wreaks
Revenge On Carroll Mix at
Kansas City.

SAYS SHE WAS JEALOUS

Entered Mix's Room and Fired at
Him Until Her Revolver
Was Emptied.

Kansas City, April 9.—Mrs. Amanda Williams, who came here recently from Texas, shot and fatally wounded Carroll Mix of Fayetteville, Ark., while the latter was asleep in his room at 410 West Ninth street early today. At the police station later she refused to talk.

Mrs. Williams and Mix were former sweethearts. The woman was deserted by her husband some time ago in a Texas town, and until recently had been at Fayetteville. Mix, it appears, came to Kansas City a few days ago to escape the woman, who had followed him, apparently intent upon taking his life. As Mix lay asleep this morning, Mrs. Williams entered his room at 5:30 o'clock and began firing at him. The first shot struck Mix in the nose, a second one hit him in the cheek; a third in the groin, and a fourth grazed his left arm. The fifth bullet, the last in the revolver, went wild. Mrs. Williams submitted to arrest quietly. Mix, who was taken to the hospital in a dying condition, said that he had come to Kansas City a few days ago to get away from the woman, and said that he did not know she was in the city. Mrs. Williams is 30 years old, and Mix is 23. The shooting occurred in the next room to that occupied by Bud Taylor, from the window of which the latter two years ago shot and killed his sweetheart, Ruth Nollard, with a rifle.

Later, Mrs. Williams consented to talk. She said she had left Fayetteville on Monday last to follow Mix, who had preceded her the day previous. She met him here two days ago, she asserted, but he had evaded her. Mrs. Williams admitted frankly that the shooting was prompted by jealousy. She said she had been deserted by her husband in Texas a year ago, and that the acquaintance with Mix, whom she had known for years, was then renewed. Mix was a farmer.

Mrs. Williams, later in a statement to the reporter, admitted that she had purchased the revolver with which she shot Mix a month ago, and that she had planned the shooting deliberately. She was
