Hon. Geo. Paul died at 10 o'clock Saturday morning.

This announcement will be a great shock to all—a painful surprise to more—for few knew he had been dangerously ill since Wednesday night, only. At that time, he was prostrated by a severe attack of congestion of the lungs, from which he never rallied, his poor health of the past two years having undermined the powers of recuperation.

The sudden taking from our midst of this familiar face, will be as though an unheralded bolt from Heaven were to destroy the old Capitol, which so long has greeted us day by day.

The deceased was born in Petersburg, Pennsylvania, Christmas day, 1824. He came to Iowa (then called Black Hawk Purchase) in 1836, and learned the printer's trade at Ft. DEATH OF A BUSY LIFE.

At 10 o'clock this morning at his residence, Hon George Paul breathed his last, closing a very eventful and useful life. Ever since 7 o'clock this morning the deceased had been lying in a state of unconsciousness and at 10 o'clock this morning his great spirit gave up the battle and passed away. So prominent has the deceased been in public affairs that his life is part of the history of the county and city. Hon George Paul was born December 25, 1824, in Pittsburg, Pennsylvania came to Iowa (then called the Black Hawk purchase) in 1836, and learned the printer's trade at Fort Madison with J. G. Edwards, who owned and started the Burlington Hawkeye. He came to Johnson county in 1841, and was foreman of the Iowa Capital Reporter, and was one of the proprietors from 1847 to 1852. He was state printer in 1850, and sheriff of Johnson county in 1846, also member of the board of supervisors of Johnson county for four years, from 1863 to 1867, and in the Iowa legislature a member from Johnson county for the years 1871-73-74-75-79. During his service in 1878 he was successful in securing an annual endowment for the State University of \$20,000. Repeated efforts had been made to secure this endowment, followed by repeated failure. He has many warm friends in both political parties, and is well and favorably known throughout the state. He is a Democrat in politics, of the Andrew Jackson school, and well posted on all political questions. He was postmaster of Iowa City under Pierce's administration. He was married December 24, 1843, to Miss Vienna Winchester, of Iowa City. They have five children: George H., of Sturgis City, Dakota; Charles R., Gilman F., Jennie, wife of Henry Lee of Denver, Colorado; and Katie, who died in 1869. He was among the first Masons and Odd Fellows in those organizations in Iowa City.

Funeral services will occur at the Unitarian church, Monday at 2 p. m.

DEATH OF AN EARLY IOWA PIONEER.

Hon. George Paul, who died at his home in Iowa City last Saturday, was one of Iowa's most distinguished early pioneers. * * * *

Mr. Paul was an old school Democrat, but while always loyal to his convictions he was not offensive in his partisanship. He was popular with men of all parties and always respected the opinions of those who differed with him on principals of government. He was a Democrat without demagogism, something after the manner of Hon. Edward Campbell, of Fairfield, who was made nearly equally as honorable a political record in Iowa. Mr. Paul had an extensive state acquaintance and his death brought real sorrow to all the people of the state with whom he had become acquainted during his long and useful life in Iowa, a life that aided in forming the broad and substantial foundations on which the noble state has gained such unequalled honors. The Register renders this tribute of respect to the good friend of nearly 40 years acquaintance, who served his country and state so faithfully, in accordance with convictions which were not always right, but were uniformly honest as the light was given him to see the right.

DES MOINES (IDPA) — Gov.-

A FIRST

A Fact A Day About Iowa City Hon. George Paul

Keeping a semi-promise to review, to a certain degree, the
life of at least one Iowa City-Johnson county farmer, who
achieved distinction in official and editorial realms, this scribe
has assembled data, covering some of the many activities of
Hon. George Paul. A pioneer, whose connection with the
"state where the tall corn grows" dates back to a year that
few men and women of the 20th century recalled in Iowa City

—in so far as personal contact was
concerned, Mr. Paul was among
the very earliest settlers. He
was a "Christmas present" to his
parents 120 years ago, having been
born December 25, 1824, in Hunt-
ington county, Pa. This domain
was known as the "Black Hawk
purchase," in his first Iowa days,
which antedated the incorporation
of Chicago (the oldtime Fort Dear-
born) by a year.

He landed in Fort Madison in
1836 and there and then began the
study of printing, a "game" he
mastered under the tutelage of the
founder and the owner of the Bur-
lington Hawkeye. This was that
pioneer newspaperman of the Mis-
sissippi Valley, J. G. Edwards.

Five years afterwards, the Old
Capitol was taking form (a form
that was not changed to the point
of completion for nearly two gen-
erations). Mr. Paul removed to
Iowa City. Here, after his arrival,
in 1841, he became foreman of the
Iowa City Capital Reporter, which
newspaper, one of the earliest to
be founded in Iowa, was destined
to hand down its mantle to the Iowa
City Press-Citizen, through a ser-

ies of changes that covered parts
of two centuries.

HEADLINE HEADACHE

Capitol newspapermen wonder
how eastern newspapers will man-

The farmer-stockraiser-official
was not satisfied with mere manual
labor, however, in his journalistic
relationships, and therefore, in
1847, he purchased an interest in
the pioneer paper. That partial
proprietorship he retained until
1852.

During the same lustrum, he was
appointed state printer, and print-
ed much of the legislative material
during 1849. One other state
printer had served this new com-
monwealth, during the same per-
iod. He was another Iowa City
newspaper man, Garret D. Palmer,
likewise a onetime owner of the
same Capital Reporter.

Both were named when the office
was first created, their appoint-
ments dating from January 4,
1849. Thus there were two "very
first" state printers.

Prior to this honor, Mr. Paul had
been the county sheriff, the fourth
named here. This was in 1846,
when Iowa became a state, and our
elections were switched from even
to odd years. During and after the
war, he was a county supervisor,
filling that office, from 1863 to
1867.

He was elected to the legislature
repeatedly, and served in the 14th,
15th and 17th general assemblies,
in '71, '73, '74, '78 and '79. In the
17th, he and Senator Bloom, as
hereinbefore recorded, secured an
annual endowment fund of \$25,000
for the university, after numerous
efforts had failed since statehood.
President Franklin Pierce named
him postmaster of Iowa City on
April 6, 1853, the very day that
the specially-chartered Iowa City
began its official existence.

The postmaster general named the "P. M." in those days. When Mr. Paul was appointed that prerogative was the president's, and thus Franklin Pierce named the Iowa City composing room foreman.

In the fraternal world, he won prominence, and was one of the charter or near-charter members of the A. F. and A. M. and I.O.O.F. He filled numerous offices in both the Odd Fellows and Masons' lodges. Locally, too, he was a member of the board of supervisors, serving thereon from 1863 to 1867. In 1866, he was elected sheriff of Johnson county. That was the year Iowa was admitted to the Union, and the sheriffship was filled, beginning in 1867, in odd years, as against the old custom of even-year elections.

Mr. Paul once was one of the owners of the Capitol-Reporter, and in 1850, his knowledge of the mechanical "end" of the profession, led to his appointment as state printer, four years after his sheriffship began.

When all is said and done, it is quite possibly true that his work in the legislature, was the greatest service Mr. Paul ever rendered his home town (that is, Iowa City—since he was a native of Pennsylvania and came to Iowa when he was but 12, in 1836, and, as noted to Iowa City, five years later.)

He was a devoted friend of education, as remarked early in this sketch, and noted for his devotion to the university, though college educational advantages were never his own. That fact, itself, only emphasized his love of the cause.

To Mail Gas Coupons

BY ANN STEVICK
N.E.A. Staff Correspondent

WASHINGTON—You won't have to make a trip to the ration board and line up for your gas coupons if a new office of price administration plan goes through. Insurance centers will be set up throughout the country from which coupons can be sent by a mail-order system. Insurance centers were first tried experimentally. They have worked well, so it is practically decided to spread the system, having another plank in the platform to make rationing easier for the consumer.

The new taken plan will help in food rationing because stamps will be good about twice as long as before, eliminating much of the frenzy of expiration-day buying. It also will reduce the number of stamps handled by grocers and banks, and will make it easier to check up on ration accounts. OPA is busy on a counterfeiting program which includes the use of violet ray to check up on the stamps grocers turn in. Consequently, there probably will be fewer temptations to buy rationed foods without stamps.

An extra 20,000,000 pounds of butter may be coming to civilians from military stocks, and then again it may not. The War Food Administration isn't ready to say yes or no, but they say that if the better market for civilians takes place, it probably will see it in markets by the middle of March. Meanwhile WFA has announced a substantial increase in the per capita of cheddar cheese for civilians for military uses.

A Fact A Day About Iowa City Nov 27, 1944 A Pioneer Printer

Historical records and family Bibles in Johnson county attest that Hon. George Paul was a "Christmas gift" to a good, oldtime Pennsylvania couple. The Iowan-to-be was born on December 25, 1824, in Huntingdon county, Pennsylvania. In Iowa City and Johnson county, he fulfilled his destiny, by

becoming identified with numerous branches of private and public life.

In many of these he was first, or among the first, to achieve distinction in his community, after Johnson county came into being as a political unit. He arrived in Iowa City, in 1841, and settled in Clear Creek township in 1843. He came to the territory, itself before the first white man settled in Johnson county, Iowa, then the "Blackhawk Purchase", attracted him from the east in 1834.

Having learned the "art preservative of all arts" soon thereafter, on the force of the Burlington Hawkeye (then the property of its founder, J. G. Edwards), he pursued the trade in Iowa City, where he became foreman of the newborn Capital Reporter, progenitor of the Iowa City Press-Citizen. During 1847 and 1852 Mr. Paul was one of its early owners.

He was state printer, a long-time member of the Iowa legislature, representing Johnson county, first, 73 years ago, and repeatedly thereafter. In purely local circles he was a member of the board of supervisors, during and after the Civil war, and was sheriff of the county 98 years ago.

While he was in the legislature he and Senator Moses Bloom, in March and April, when production is expected to increase.

mayor and clothier in Iowa City, secured the first University of Iowa endowment of \$20,000 annually ever granted by the lawmakers to the institution. Friends of S.U.I. had tried often before, but had failed, to achieve that end.

President Franklin Pierce named him one of the first postmasters of Iowa City, in 1853. After the birth of Masonry and Odd Fellowship in Iowa City, as pioneer branches of Broodingraglan fraternal society trees Mr. Paul became a member of each order, early in the respective histories of the organizations.

His wife was Miss Henrietta Winchester, of Iowa City, Christmas again touched his life especially, as the marriage was solemnized Christmas Eve 1843. Their children were George, Charles, Gilman, Jennie, and Kate. Miss Jennie married Henry Lee, widely-known here, and afterwards a Colorado business leader who helped to build Denver to vast Metropolitan stature.

Many Iowa City pioneers who continued active farming until they passed away, or retired years before their death, owned fine orchards. One of the finest in the country districts was Mr. Paul's in Clear Creek. He founded it in the early '40's, planting it with apple trees from the nursery of Nicholas Longworth (not a Rooseveltian "Nick" Longworth) and other, fewer, trees. It was the township's first orchard.

He was the first librarian of the State Historical Society.

J. G. PATTON, farmer, post-office River Junction; was born in Fayette county, Pennsylvania, October 30, 1840. At the age of ten he moved to Steubenville, Ohio, with his father, who was a printer and one of the old Jacksonian men. He published the "Genius of Liberty," at Uniontown, Pennsylvania, and claimed to be first man that pushed Jackson's name for president, being a personal friend of his. In 1854, he came to Iowa City, where he lived until his death, November, 1861. The subject of this sketch learned the printer's trade in the old "Capital Reporter" office, now the "State Press," commencing when eighteen years of age. In September, 1861, he enlisted in company F, First Iowa cavalry, and spent three years and a half in the army. Since returning from the army he has paid his attention to farming, and now owns 140 acres of land. He was married December 19, 1864, to Miss Effie Dodder, a native of New Jersey. They have six children, viz., William C., Nellie, Fannie, Frank M., Charles J., and Effie. Mr. Patton spent two years in Kansas and was constable and deputy sheriff in Iowa City under M. Cavanaugh two years.

HON. GEORGE PAUL, a farmer and stock-raiser, residing in Clear Creek township, post-office address, Iowa City; was born December 25, 1824, in Petersburg, Pennsylvania; came to Iowa (then called the Black Hawk purchase) in 1836, and learned the printer's trade at Fort Madison with J. G. Edwards, who owned and started the Burlington *Hawkeye*. He came to Johnson county in 1841, and was foreman of the Iowa *Capital Reporter*, and was one of the proprietors from 1847 to 1852. He was state printer in 1850, and sheriff of Johnson county in 1846, also member of the board of supervisors of Johnson county for four years, from 1863 to 1867, and in the Iowa legislature a member from Johnson county for the years 1871-73-74-78-79. During his service in 1878 he was successful in securing an annual endowment for the State University of \$20,000. Repeated efforts had been made to secure this endowment, followed by repeated failure. The Hon. M. Bloom rendered valuable service with Mr. Paul in securing this endowment. He has many warm friends in both political parties, and is well and favorably known throughout the state. He is a democrat in politics, of the Andrew Jackson school, and well posted on all political questions. He was postmaster of Iowa City

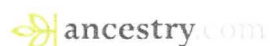

E. H. PEFFER, a farmer residing in Penn township, post-office, North Liberty; was born March 22, 1818, in Cumberland county, Pennsylvania. He is a hatter by trade, learned and worked at his trade in Trumbull county, Ohio. He was married to Miss Liddie A. Brown, of Trumbull county, Ohio, in 1841. They had the following named children: Sylvester W., William H., John W. and Samuel J. His wife died Sept. 28, 1858. He settled in Penn township, Johnson county, Iowa, in 1866. He married Mrs. Annie Cramer, Feb. 19, 1867. He is engaged in raising and manufacturing of sorghum and has been very successful.

JAMES PETERS, farmer and stock raiser, Cedar township, post-office, Morse; was born in Tipperary, Ireland, in 1822. Son of John and Johanna Peters. He came to New York, in 1852, and then moved to Ohio where he lived about eighteen months, when he came to Cedar township, and settled on a farm, and in 1862 was married to Miss Mary Ryan, daughter of Michael and Mary Ryan of Cedar township. They have seven children living, four boys and three girls. He is a member of the Catholic Church.

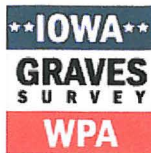
