- He owned 700 acres of land in Farmington, Boone County, Iowa, 400 acres was underlaid with coal, he raised livestock.

Col. O. H. P. Scott, of Farmington, and one of the most prominent men of Van Buren Co. died at his home last Monday night of cancer in the stomach. Col. Scott won distinction as a soldier and officer in the 3d Iowa cavalry during the rebellion, and since the close of the war has resided on his farm near Farmington. Three years ago he represented Van Buren County in the Legislature, with credit to himself and his county. He was a man of the strictest integrity and was universally respected by all who knew him. His death leaves a vacancy that will be felt by all in his community, and especially in his family will the loss of a kind father and husband rest heavily on the afflicted ones.

Death of Hon. O. H. P. Scott of Farmington, Iowa.

We are indebted to Major J. S. Love of this place, for a copy of the Keokuk Daily Constitution, containing the following notice of the death of a former resident of McConnellsville.

Death is thinning the ranks of the old and energetic men whose lives have been closely connected with the growth and prosperity of south-eastern Iowa. During the past year the Constitution has been called upon to note the passing away of one veteran here and another there, as the sythe of the destroyer has cut down the fully ripened forms of men who have left an impression on the communities in which they lived, which will last for many generations.

It has become again to day our sad duty to add another to the list.

At seven o'clock and twenty-five minutes Sunday night, November, 14th, Col. O. H. P. Scott of Farmington, Van Buren county, Iowa, was called from labor to rest. His death was not unexpected, he having been sick for several months with a painful and fatal disease—cancer or tumor of the stomach and bowels. He died surrounded by his family and friends, under the care of those who did everything that loving hands could do to soothe and comfort him as he was passing through the valley.

OLIVER HAZARD PERRY SCOTT was born in Ohio, about the year 1815—we have not the means of obtaining the exact date—and was named after the hero of the battle of Lake Erie. He entered into the active business of life at an early age. In 1839 he was superintendent of a contract on the Muskingum river improvement and was living with his parents at McConnellsville, Ohio. A year later he was contractor on the Hocking Valley canal. Afterwards he owned and operated a merchant flouring mill at Malta, Ohio. He was married to Ellen Fay at McConnellsville in 1845. Came west early in the '50s, and for many years thereafter was contractor on various public works—the Des Moines River by contracts, and that of the State Historical Society, Joseph, Mo., and other places. At the breaking out of the late civil war, Mr. Scott volunteered in the Third Iowa Cavalry, served with distinction and was promoted, ranking as major when he retired from the service. After an active life of nearly half a century, a few years ago, he purchased a valuable farm near Farmington, where he has since lived until his death. He has devoted his time mostly of later years to the improvement of his farm and to the development of coal mines that were opened on his place. In 1877 the people of Van Buren co. elected him to the legislature by a flattering majority—he being a democrat and the county largely republican. He served his constituents faithfully, and could have been returned had he not declined a re-nomination. He leaves a wife and two sons, one of them married. One son, the only other child born to him, died a few months ago.

Col. Scott was a man of strong sense, elegant manners and large influence. He leaves a social, business and public record without a stain. In early years he was a partner of Col. A. Hosmer of this city, in some contracts in Ohio, to whom we are under obligations for some of the above incidents connected with his life. He has left his family in comfortable circumstances, but beyond that he has left them that which is above all price a good name.

Col. Scott was well known in this city—having enjoyed intimate business and social relations with many of our citizens. His death will be a severe loss not only to his family and the community in which he lived, but to this section of our state.

Col. Scott's funeral will take place to-morrow (Tuesday) from his residence near Farmington.

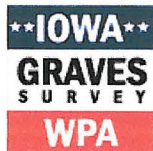
