We are indebted to Major J. S. Love of this place, for a copy of the Keokuk Daily Constitution, containing the following notice of the death of a former resident of Mc-Connelsville.

Death is thinning the ranks of the old and energetic men whose lives have been closely connected with the growth and prosperity of southeastern Iowa. During the past year the Constitution has been called upon to note the passing away of one veteran here and another there, as the sythe of the destroyer has cut down the fully ripened forms of men who have left an impression on the communities in which they lived, which will last for many generation.

It has become again to day our sad duty to add another to the list.

At seven o'clock and twenty five minutes Sunday night, November, 14th, Col. O. H. P. Scott of Farmington, Van Buren county, Iowa, was called from labor to rest. His death was not unexpected, he having been sick for several months with a painful and fatal disease cancer or tumor of the stomach and bowels. He died surrounded by his family and friends, under the care of those who did everything that loving hands could do to soothe and comfort him as he was passing through the valley.

OLIVER HAZARD PERRY SCOTT Was born in Ohio, about the year 1815 we have not the means of obtaining the exact date—and was named at ter the hero of the battle of Lake Erie. 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
