Mr. G. T. Clark, the subject of this obituary, was born in White County, Tenn., March 25th, 1823, and died at his home in Pella, Ia., Nov. 26, 1908, aged 85 years and 8 months.

While young he came with his parents to Lee County, Iowa, and later he settled in Marion County, where he lived until his death, spending the latter part of his life in Pella, Ia. On Oct. 5th, 1846, he was united in marriage to Miss Nancy Wilson, to this union were born four sons and three daughters. Two sons and two daughters survive him, Thomas J. Clark of Mahaska Co., Mrs. Louisa Richardson, of Mahaska Co., Mr. A. H. Clark of Pella, Ia. and Mrs. Adelia Miller of Harlan, Ia.

He was converted in his youth and united with the Methodist Episcopal church, of which he remained a faithful and consistent member until the day of his death. He was one of the early law makers of Iowa, having been elected four times as representative of Marion Co.

He leaves to mourn their loss two sisters, two sons and two daughters, four grand daughters, nine grand sons, and eleven great-grand-children, besides other relatives and a host of acquaintances and friends.
