Death of L. D. Lane.

Mr. Lorenzo D. Lane died at his home in Minneapolis, Minn., December 30, 1904. He was born in Licking county, Ohio, July 29, 1830, and at Delaware, in that state, he was married to Miss Mary A. Mickle in 1853. Four years later Mr. Lane and his young wife removed to Freeport, Ill., and in 1868 to Franklin county. To Mr. and Mrs. Lane five children were born, but two of whom survive their father, William Lane, of Hampton, and Flora Lane, of Minneapolis. Mrs. Lane died in 1888. Mr. Lane became a member of the Hampton M. E. church in 1872, at which time the church was under the pastorate of Rev. W. F. Thorpe and while he has resided in Minneapolis for two years prior to his death, his membership was continued with the church here. Deceased was a machinist by trade and enjoyed a liberal education. Mr. Lane was a quiet, retiring man, but was ever thoughtful of others and always solicitous that his family be well cared for. His recent removal to Minneapolis was for the purpose of giving his grandson an education in the university of Minnesota. For many years Mr. Lane was engaged in the book and stationery business in Hampton and was proprietor of the electric light plant here for several years. During his residence in Franklin county Mr. Lane on several occasions served the people in positions of trust, among which was as a member of the board of supervisors and representative in the legislature.

Mr. Lane had been confined to his home about two and one-half months, yet his call was sudden. While seated at the supper table apparently in better health than for several days, he was stricken with apoplexy and quietly and peacefully went to sleep. The remains were brought here for burial, the funeral occurring at the M. E. church Monday afternoon at 8:00 o'clock. Rev. E. T. Gruwell conducted the services and many friends of years standing were present at the last sad rites.
