**HOW DID ROOSEVELT DO IT?  
Georgian Would Have Congress Inquire into African Trip**

WASHINGTON, D. C., Dec. 31.—The African hunting trip as organized and carried out by the Smithsonian institute, via Roosevelt, is the subject of the latest congressional investigation. A suggestion was received here today by Representative Rainey of Illinois, from a citizen of a Georgia town, who referred to such an inquiry as a "public service," and to the Smithsonian as a "trash-heap institution." Rainey is the Democrat who recently introduced a resolution to inquire into the manner in which Roosevelt obtained transportation and supplies on his trips about the country while he was president. This resolution was promptly pigeon-holed.

**COPPER AND GOLD PRODUCTION  
Lead and Zinc Totals Are Also Compiled by the Government**

WASHINGTON, Dec. 31.—Activity in the production of copper, lead and zinc from the primary sources in the United States was greater in 1909 than in any previous year. Complete production figures for the year have just been issued by the United States geological survey. The total output of copper from the smelters was 1,092,511,625 pounds of lead, 457,045 tons, and of zinc, 255,760 tons. The production of gold has been approximately \$16,360,000, as compared with \$20,371,000 in 1909.

**COMMISSIONERS**

WASHINGTON, Dec. 31.—An international railway commission, with supervisory authority over railroads operating between the United States and Canada is practically assured.

After many months of negotiation between the governments of the United States and Canada, the conclusion was reached yesterday which means that in the course of probably few months, regulatory authority will be extended over the railway operations between the two countries.

For several days, Chairman Mark A. Knapp of the commerce commission and J. G. Mable, chief of the railway commission of Canada, have been in conference, as representatives of their respective governments.

The commissioners reached agreement last Wednesday. Since then, they have been working on details of their reports. Yesterday Knapp and Mable called at the department of state and presented a joint report. The text is not available.
