Another old settler of Story
county has passed away, George M.
Maxwell, familiarly known as "Un-
cle George," died in Cambridge, Ia.,
on last Friday evening, August 2nd
1889, of paralysis, aged 75 years, 6
months and 28 days. Mr. Maxwell
was born in Ohio in 1814. For
many years he lived in Lafayette,
Indiana, where he was engaged in
business. He always took an active
part in political matters, and many
a poor slave, in the days of slavery,
owed his freedom to "Uncle George."
He moved to Story county in 1856
and settled on his farm east of Iowa
Center. In 1867 he moved to Cam-
bridge and since that time has been
engaged in the mercantile busi-
ness, connected with Baldwin &
Maxwell, of this place. Until late
years he has always taken much in-
terest in political matters and had
many warm friends of all parties
all over the state of Iowa, who will
regret to hear of his death. He
served two terms in the State House
of Representatives and one term in
the Senate. That he commanded
the highest respect of his associates
is shown by the large attendance at
his funeral last Sunday at Cam-
bridge. The services were conduct-
ed by the Rev. Samuel Jones of
Perry, assisted by Rev. Tennant.
The remains were taken to the Iowa
Center cemetery for interment.

August 2nd at 10 o'clock P. M. at his residence at Cambridge Iowa, the Hon. George M. Maxwell. The funeral services were held in the M. E. church in Cambridge Sunday A. M. and the body interred in the cemetery at Iowa Center in the afternoon. The largest number of persons ever assembled in Cambridge on a funeral occasion were in attendance last Sabbath, paying their tribute of respect in the funeral rites of Uncle George Maxwell.

Mr. Maxwell was 75 years 9 months and 28 days old at the time of his death. He was born in Miamisburg Montgomery county Ohio. He moved to Iowa in 1856 and to Cambridge in 1867, and for the last 22 years has been most intimately associated with the interests of Cambridge and Story county. Mr. Maxwell being a man of great brain power, was during his life chosen to many places of honor and trust; and faithful to his constituents and the laws of his country, never failed to do his whole duty at all times and in every place. He at one time served as Mayor of Layayette Indiana, and during the war of the Rebellion was Provost Marshal for this district of Iowa. He served in the Legislature of Iowa as Representative and as Senator two terms. During all his life in official capacity, in business transactions and social intercourse, he was always found to be a man of true integrity, and we can truly record the fact that no man in Story county had more admiring friends than Hon. G. M. Maxwell. He leaves a large family to mourn his loss, and they are but a tithe of those who are deeply bereaved by the death of noble Uncle George Maxwell. Having spent a life so full of merit, it may well be said of him, "Well done good and faithful servant." He has fought a good fight and there is laid up for him in Heaven a crown of glory. We shall not with our mortal vision see him again, but we know if we are faithful to the end to do those things commanded us in God's word, we shall at the last in the twinkling of an eye be changed and the dead of earth and sea and the living of Heaven shall be caught up together to ever be in the presence of the
