**JOHN R. McLUCAS, OBITUARY**

John Ritter McLucas was born at South Bend, Ind., August 27, 1836, and passed out of this life from the home of his daughter, Mrs. G. W. Willis on Wade street in South Des Moines, Iowa, at 8 a. m., May 28, 1924, at the age of 87 years, 9 months and 1 day.

On April 10, 1859, he was united in marriage to Miss Eliza Ellen Bates to this union 7 children were born; two died in infancy, the following survive their beloved father: Ed McLucas of Koshknig, Mo., Elmer McLucas of Yakama, Wash., Verne and W. C. McLucas and daughter, Mrs. G. W. Willis, whose residences are in Des Moines, Iowa.

The wife and mother died in 1914 and her funeral services were held in the same place where her husband's were held just 10 years later, in the Dunn funeral parlors, in Des Moines.

In 1855 Mr. McLucas moved with his family from Indiana to Redfield, Iowa, from which place they moved to Des Moines where he has resided for 24 years.

The deceased was a life long consistent member of the Methodist Episcopal church and an earnest Christian. Because of the infirmity of old age he has been unable to attend the church services as was his great desire.

Mr. Lucas was left an orphan in early childhood, both his father and his mother having died, and their deaths were not far apart. With these great odds against him he grew to noble manhood marked with excellent character, industry dan diligence, and many Christian virtues and qualities. 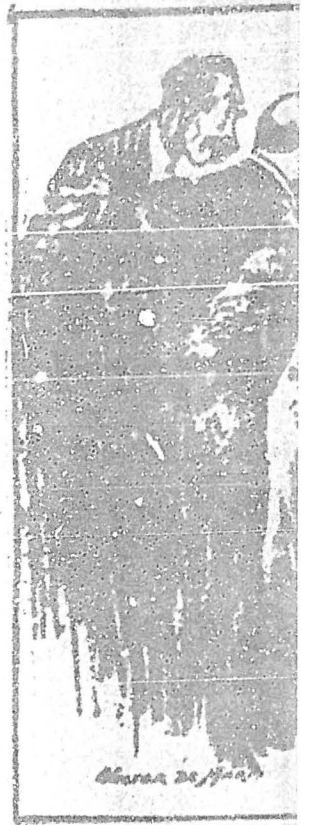
