- He learned to set type in Hagerstown, Pennsylvania, while attending college.
- James established the newspaper in Des Moines named The Des Moines News in 1871, first issue on 4 Jul 1871.
- It is claimed that he was an unusually clever writer.
- He published the paper until selling it to L. E. Barnard and B. N. McKenna. He wrote his last article 30 Sept 1891.

- He established a newspaper first at Albia, Iowa which was not successful, then worked in the newspaper office at Albia and Chariton, both towns in Iowa. Later he went to Des Moines, Iowa in Humboldt County and worked there for the winter in The Humboldt Independent.
- He then started The Lake City Blade Lake City, Iowa and then the opportunity to start The Des Moines News came and he operated the paper until October 1891.
- In 1871 he moved to Des Moines, Iowa and engaged in the insurance business.
- In 1902 he moved to Oklahoma where he engaged for a time in the newspaper business. In 1907 he moved to Wichita, Kansas.
- He kept a diary while imprisoned in the Civil War and was used for his book "Andersonville and Storm", prison of the Civil War.

**Veteran of the Civil War is Dead Today in Wichita.**

Wichita, Kans., May 8—James N. Miller, 75, Civil war veteran, died at his home here today after an illness of two years. He served three years in the Twelfth West Virginia Infantry. Captured by the Confederates, he spent seven months in the Andersonville and Florence prisons, later writing a book about his experiences. He came to Wichita from Morrison, Okla., in 1907.

**JAMES N. MILLER DIES  
AT HOME, WICHITA, KANS.**

**PIONEER SAC CITY EDITOR, 20  
YEARS PUBLISHER OF THE  
SAC SUN, AGED 75 YRS.**

Came to Sac City with His Bride from Pennsylvania in 1871—High Ideals for Community Upheld Unceasingly.

James N. Miller, the first editor in Sac City and founder of The Sac Sun, died at his home at Wichita, Kansas at 11:19 o'clock a. m. on Monday, May 8 after declining health of several months due to the failure of his heart to function properly. The funeral will be held today at Wichita, where he resided for the last fifteen years. The message announcing Mr. Miller's death was sent on Monday by his daughter, Mrs. Blaine M. Staat of Grinnell, Iowa, who had been helping to care for him for a number of weeks.

Mr. Miller was born over 75 years ago in Pennsylvania. In his reminiscences, written for The Sac Sun on the occasion of its 50th anniversary in July, 1921, he told that his first work in a printing office was in the winter of 1861-2, where he learned to set type in an office in Waynesburg, Pa., while attending college. In July, 1862, when he was still a mere boy, he enlisted in the Union army. He remained in the service until the fall of 1865. Then he took up the print-

er's trade in the office of a church paper which was conducted by an older brother. In the summer of 1868 a Republican candidate for congress helped him buy a paper which he published until May, 1870, when he sold it and left for Iowa to make his home. He established a paper at Eldora which did not prove a success. He then started on a tour of the state and worked in offices at Albia and Chariton. Later in the fall he went to Dakota City, Humboldt county, and worked through the winter in the office of the Independent, which was then conducted by Isaiah Van Meter.

Came to Sac City 51 Years Ago. In the spring of 1871 Mr. Miller returned to Pennsylvania and on his way to Iowa with his bride. Learning from a printer, who had started the Blade in Lake City, about the opportunity at Sac City, he came at once to

led career, which, while adding to my knowledge of the world has not materially increased my stock of Liberty bonds. Now, at the age of 75, I am in possession of reasonable health and leading a quiet life in a pleasant city." He added: "It would be a delight to visit once more the beautiful town [Sac City] and splendid county, but this is uncertain." However, that delightful anticipation was realized. Last fall Mr. and Mrs. Miller, after a visit with their daughter in Grinnell, came to Sac City on Friday, October 14 and stayed over Sunday, putting in several busy and delightful days receiving cordial greetings from their old friends. There can be no question that those were red letter days in the lives of Mr. and Mrs. Miller and heartily appreciated. Those who heard Mr. Miller in his address at the Presbyterian church on the Sunday evening during his visit will recall what he said of his love for the plain gospel of Christ.

Mr. Miller is survived by his companion of more than fifty years, his daughter, Mrs. Blaine M. Staat of Grinnell, Iowa, and his son, James Cuyler Miller, a newspaper publisher at Eads, Colo., and by the two children of James Cuyler Miller, Virginia and James.

While the present publishers of the Sun did not enjoy the privilege of a long personal acquaintance with Mr. Miller they have appreciated his encouragement and his contributions of pioneer reminiscences from time to time during the twenty-eight and one half years they have been in charge of the paper he founded and, like all of the old-time residents of Sac City, feel that they have lost a personal friend.

The ceremony was performed by Rev. E. C. McDade, pastor of the Methodist church, and Mr. Conger and his bride departed on the evening train for Winnipeg, Canada and Chicago. "An unusual bit of romance enters into the story of this interesting social event. Mrs. Crowley's late husband, Mr. Newman Crowley, for many years a prominent business man of northwest Iowa, was a boyhood chum and later for many years a business partner of Mr. Ira Conger, who married his sister, Miss Sara E. Crowley. Both Mr. Crowley and his sister, Mrs. Conger, died some years ago. The families long intimately associated in friendship are once more united in the marriage of Mrs. Crowley and Mr. Conger.

This is a suit to recover \$1,336.87, the sum alleged to be owed the plaintiff on merchandise sold the Nemaha Cooperative Co. by the plaintiff company and the Welch Cook Co. and the Mishawaka Woolen Co., the two companies last mentioned assigning to the plaintiff. It is alleged by the plaintiff that the defendants as directors of the Nemaha Co-operative Company are obligated for these bills on the ground that they permitted the indebtedness to be incurred after they knew that indebtedness already was in excess of two-thirds of the capital stock and that they permitted funds of the company to be diverted and dividends issued so as to diminish the capital stock. 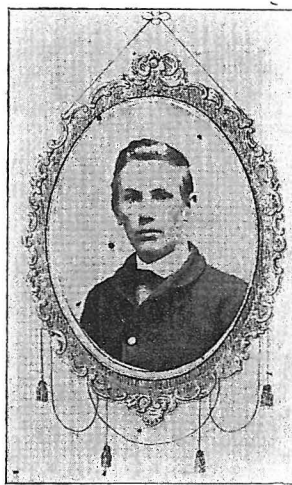

## INTRODUCTION.

THOSE who took part in the civil war, and who wish to leave any record of its scenes and incidents, must do so soon. Another decade will muster out of life's service the soldiers, or leave them too old for historical or other work.

This little book is written without pretense to extended detail of the events described, but only to tell to those who do not care to read the larger works, in plain and simple language the story of the two famous prisons of the civil war. The reader will discover that it is without prejudice or undue feeling. Time has softened the intensity which formerly existed, and it is now seen that what was once believed to be diabolical and intentional cruelty was the result of circumstances partly beyond the control of those who were placed in charge of prisoners.

To the remaining white-haired comrades of the war, some of whom were confined with me, I trust this will prove of interest; and the general reader will also, it is hoped, find the simple narrative both interesting and instructive. A diary kept during the imprisonment is the basis of the narrative, and certainly it is a truthful one.

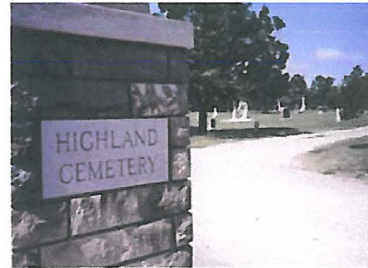

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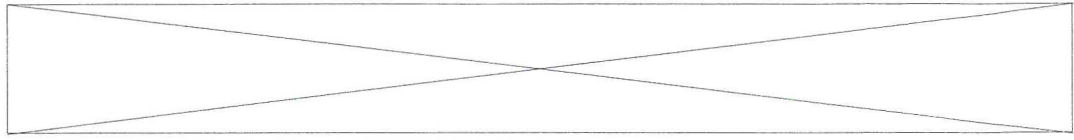
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
