GONE TO THE LIFE BEYOND.

Hon. H. B. Wood, after a brief illness, of pneumonia, passed away at his home on West Third street, Saturday morning February 21st, about 10 o'clock. The funeral occurred the following day, services being conducted at the family residence, by Rev. A. S. Cochran,, pastor of the M. E. church.


Mr. Wood had lived in Spencer about twenty years. He was born in Tompkins county, New York, October 25th, 1828 and was, therefore in his 63d year at the time of his death. In the year 1840, with his father's family, he came west and settled in Wisconsin in which state he lived till 1869, when he moved to Butler county, this state, and two years later, he located in Spencer, where he has since resided. His early life was spent on his fther's farm, and later, for some years, he pursued the profession of teaching, after which, for several years, he engaged in the practice of law. The fall of 1871 he was elected to represent this district in the Iowa legislature, and was re-elected two years later. As a legislator Mr. Wood made a good record, and through his influence bills of special importance to this quarter of the state were enacted into laws: In 1879 he was appointed deputy auditor, and two years later was elected to that office, which position he continued to hold for eight successive years, and doubtless could have held longer, would his health have permitted it, for no man ever discharged the dulles of office with greater fidelity than did he. In all his relations of life, whether as teacher, attorney, legislator, or citizen in whatever capacity, deceased was ever a true and just man, in the highest sense. That being does not live who can truly say that Henry B. Wood ever knowingly or intentionally wronged or injured him. 
