Death of Hon. James P. Ketcham.

Hon. James P. Ketcham, the head of
the firm of Ketcham & Bro., dealers in
lumber in Chicago and Marengo, died
at his residence, No. 399 Ashland boule-
vard, Chicago, on Monday morning, Feb-
ruary 15, aged 54 years, 2 months and 26
days.

Mr. Ketcham was born in Philadelphia,
Penna., Nov. 19, 1837. He located in Ma-
rengo in the fall of 1860, and entered into
the lumber and grain business, which he
conducted until 1872, when he removed
to Chicago, where he has since resided.

During his residence in Marengo Mr.
K., besides being a thoroughgoing busi-
ness man, took an active interest in poli-
tics, and held several positions of honor
and trust. He was a member of the
Board of Supervisors in 1867-8, and was
chairman of the Board in 1868. In 1869 he
was elected to the lower house of the
Thirteenth General Assembly, serving
one term. In 1871 he was elected to the
State Senate. This position he resigned
in the summer of 1872, when he removed
to Chicago. On his arrival in Chicago
Mr. Ketcham took a prominent place in
business circles, and was for two terms
president of the Lumbermen's Exchange.
He was First Vice President of the Build-
ers and Traders' Exchange, and was a
trustee and elder of the Third Presbyte-
rian Church.

About seven years ago Mr. Ketcham
had a stroke of paralysis, from the
effects of which he never recovered, and
which incapacitated him from active busi-
ness.

On the 14th of September, 1863, Mr.
Ketcham was married to Miss Agnes C.
Adams, daughter of Mrs. Elizabeth and
the late N. M. Adams, Sr., of Koszta,
who, with one son, now a young man of
26, survive to mourn the loss of a loving
husband, a kind and affectionate father.

The remains will arrive in Marengo to-
morrow (Thursday) morning, at 8:40, and
be at once taken to the Presbyterian
church. The coffin lid will be opened at
10, and closed finally at 10:30, at which
time brief services will be held. Then
the burial will occur at the cemetery.
