# C. H. WILSON DIED SATURDAY EVENING

FUNERAL SERVICE TOMORROW,  
TUESDAY, AT 2:00 P. M. IN  
M. E. CHURCH

C. H. Wilson died Saturday evening February the 28th 1925 at the home of his son Frank L. Wilson on E. Main Street at 8:26 o'clock in the evening. Mr. Wilson's condition had been very serious for about three weeks. He had been confined to his bed for about that length of time but prior to that he had been up and about, following his accustomed habits, going down town daily and mingling with people in his wonted way.

Mr. Wilson died at the age of ninety. He was in his ninety-first year. Few indeed are permitted to attain to such a grand old age. While the latter months of his life showed a very noticeable depreciation in his faculties yet for many years past the allotted term of the average old gentleman's life Mr. Wilson retained his mental vigor, his physical endurance, and was an unimpaired part of the social, business, political and church complex of Washington.

He possessed in a remarkable degree some of those characteristics that make for a long useful life. He was evenly tempered; not given to excitement; mental explosions, or unnecessary worry. He had a keen sense of humor; did not borrow trouble; retained always a deep interest in the affairs of the day; devoted his thoughts to the things of the world rather than to brooding over non-essentials and uselessly contemplating unhappy possibilities. While he lived, he lived as one who was satisfied to take things as they came in this world, content to leave the future in the hands of the Master of all human destinies.

When it is known that Mr. Wilson was at one time our representative in the state legislature; was chosen twice by the people of this city as their mayor; was a city councilman during several terms; was for many years an official in the Methodist Episcopal church in this city; was the secretary of the Washington Loan and Building Association for thirty years; was in active business in the city as a grocer and later as a hardware merchant for many years, it will be understood that his career as an active and useful citizen has been a most notable one.

In fact, in Mr. Wilson's death the city witnesses the passing of one who came near to filling the ideal requirements of citizenship. He lived among us and did his part; shirking no duties, making it plain always where he stood on the issues of the day. His movements looking toward the betterment of the social and moral conditions in the community.

## Washington Pioneer Taken



CHARLES HELLEN WILSON  
April 25, 1834 — February 28, 1925

Mr. Wilson was the last of his immediate family in this country. Another brother, William Wilson Jr. was prominent in local circles here for many years. He and his brother, Charles were in the hardware business for a number of years together. The brother, William, Jr. died about twenty years ago and one by one the other members of the family dropped away. Mr. C. H. was the only remaining member of the family and now he is gone. A half sister of a younger generation is still living. She is Annie Knox, wife of one of the vice presidents of the Mellon National Bank at Pittsburgh.

In like manner it might be said that Mr. Wilson was the last of a peculiarly intimate group of old timers to pass away. He belonged more especially to that particular period in our city's history in which H. A. Burrell, A. H. Wallace, William Blair, Judge A. R. Dewey, John Alex Young, and others belonged.

One by one those men have passed on and left Mr. Wilson as the last of that interesting coterie of citizens. Perhaps he missed them a great deal; it is possible that at times he became a little lonely for the companionship of those who lived in the same earlier age that he did, but he didn't show his loneliness; he was happy in his surroundings and was remarkably modern in his appreciations.

The funeral service will be held tomorrow, Tuesday afternoon at 2 o'clock at the Methodist church, conducted by Dr. W. W. Bowers. Burial will be in Elm Grove.

In politics he was a Republican; in his church affiliations a Methodist, and he was conspicuously active in both politics and church work.

As a husband, a father, and as a citizen Mr. Wilson will stand high on the honor roll. He lived through a long day; he labored diligently and effectively and in the evening of his life he enjoyed the tender care and devotion of his son and daughter-in-law in a home in which his every want was tenderly looked after, and at night he laid down and quietly went to sleep.

Mr. Wilson's full name was Charles Hellen Wilson. He was born April 25th 1834 in Uniontown, Fayette county, Pennsylvania. He was a son of William Wilson Sr. and Minerva J. Hellen Wilson. He attended the common schools and then when he was seventeen years of age he entered a printing office to learn the printers trade. His first work was in the office of the Pennsylvania Democrat. He got the western fever soon however and came to Iowa locating at Muscatine where he got work in the office of the Muscatine Journal. He worked there as a printer for about a year and then bought a half interest in the paper. His partner was Orion Clemons, a brother of Mark Twain. In January 1855 Mr. Wilson with his partner established the daily Muscatine Journal, one of the first dailies in the state.

While living in Muscatine Mr. Wilson was married to Lucy Jane Gray of Green County Pennsylvania. A daughter, Ellie Wallace Wilson was born to this union. This daughter later became the wife of Norton C. Cerbin of this city. Her death occurred April 26th 1911. Mr. Wilson retired from the newspaper business in 1858 and the family moved to Washington and there was born to them here three children: Charles Gray Wilson, who lives in Chicago; Frank Louis Wilson, this city; and Robert Wilson who died May 28th 1894. The wife and mother died in this city July 3rd 1896.

Mr. Wilson was again married November 24th 1870 to Mary Alice Beard. To this marriage were born three children: Henry David Wilson, George Meason Wilson and Laura Minerva Wilson. The boys, Henry and George died while they were boys and the daughter Laura is now Mrs. Thad Smith of Marshalltown. The mother of these children died March 21, 1903 at the Augustana hospital in Chicago.

## FORMER MAYOR OF WASHINGTON PASSES AWAY

Charles H. Wilson Worked at Printing Case With Mark Twain.

Washington, Ia., Feb. 28.—

Charles H. Wilson, former mayor of the city of Washington and in his younger days a fellow-printer with Mark Twain on the old Muscatine Journal, died here at 8:30 o'clock tonight. He was 90 years old.

An active worker in the political, business, social and religious life of Washington county for more than half a century, Mr. Wilson will be mourned by a wide circle of friends. He made his home here since 1857.

Born in Uniontown, Pa., on April 10, 1834 Mr. Wilson started to "see the world" in his young manhood. He came up the Mississippi from Cairo, Ill. in 1855 and went to work on the Journal which was owned by Orion Clemens, brother of Mark Twain (Samuel Clemens). Two years later he went to Washington where he has since made his home.

After working for a few years as a grocer he helped to organize the Washington Loan & Building Co. and served as its executive until ten years ago when the need for the company was diminished and resulted in a liquidation.

As a Whig and later as a Republican Mr. Wilson was active in politics. He served as mayor of Washington in 1905-06 and in the state legislature in 1874. He was also on the school board and in the city council at various times.

For 66 years he was a devout Methodist, except when ill he never missed services at the local church. Mr. Wilson was married twice, his second wife preceeding him in death some 20 years ago. Despite his age he made a trip to his old home in Uniontown, Pa. each year.

The survivors are two sons Charles Wilson of Chicago, make up director for the Chicago Evening Post, and Frank Wilson, local shoe merchant, and one daughter, Mrs. Thad Smith. A son Burt and a daughter Mrs. N. C. Corbin preceeded him in death. Nine grandchildren and six great-grandchildren survive.

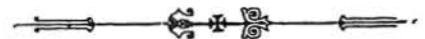
**O**S. PICKENS, residing upon section 1, Marion Township, has been a resident of Washington County since 1856. He is a native of Chautauqua County, N. Y., born in 1831, and is the son of William H. and Flora A. (Smith) Pickens, the former a native of Massachusetts, and the latter of New York. On the father's side he is of Irish descent, and on the mother's side of New England descent. His mother died when he was a small boy, and his father in the fall of 1859, at the age of sixty-one. When about ten years of age, the father moved to Pennsylvania, where he remained two years.

In 1852, the subject of this sketch came to Washington County, Iowa, and made claim to eighty acres of land in Franklin Township, and then returned to New York. In 1856, he again came to Washington County, Iowa, and settled in Brighton, engaged in farming and laboring until the breaking out of the war. In October, 1861, he enlisted in the 2d Iowa Infantry, and served until June, 1862, when he was discharged for disabilities acquired while in the service. He was in the battles of Ft. Donelson, Shiloh and Corinth. After the battle at Corinth he was sent to a hospital at Keokuk, where he remained until his discharge. Returning to Brighton, he there remained until the spring of 1863, when he rented a farm in Dutch Creek Township, and there lived for two years. He then

moved to Seventy-Six Township, where he rented a farm for one year, and then purchased eighty acres of unimproved land on section 5, Seventy-Six Township, which he improved and on which he lived until 1868, when he sold the same and purchased 100 acres of land on section 1, Marion Township, where he has since continued to reside, and where he has now a well-improved farm of 136 acres.

Mr. Pickens was married, Oct. 21, 1851, to Myrtilla Matteson, a native of New York, and daughter of Joel and Mary (Sherman) Matteson. To them eight children have been born: Elias L. is a printer by trade, and is now living in Dakota, engaged in publishing the *Harrison Globe*; Francis E., now in Dakota, engaged in farming; George Byron died Oct. 5, 1859, aged six months; Orange Smith, Jr., now resides in Dakota and is engaged in farming; Mordecai Ellis died April 2, 1866, aged one year, two months and thirteen days; Eva May is the wife of John Davidson of this county; Ernest Eugene died Feb. 20, 1875, aged seven years and two months; Mary Alice is living at home.

Mr. Pickens, wife and four of their children are members of the Christian Church. In politics he is a Republican. When Mr. Pickens came to Washington County he was not the possessor of a dollar. That which he now has, he has acquired by his own exertion, assisted by his good wife and children. In the community where he resides, and by all who know him, he is universally respected, and enjoys the confidence and esteem of all.



**h**ON. CHARLES H. WILSON, grocer, of Washington, is one of the leading and representative citizens of the city and county, and is well and favorably known throughout the State. He is the son of William, Sr., and Minerva J. (Hellen) Wilson, a sketch of whom appears elsewhere in this volume, and was born in Uniontown, Fayette Co., Pa., April 25, 1834. He had the advantages of the common schools of his native town until seventeen years of age, when he entered a printing-office—the "Poor Man's College"—than which there is no better place for ac-



quiring a general knowledge of social, political, or other affairs that may be agitating State or Nation.

Our subject's first experience in the printing business was in the office of the *Pennsylvania Democrat*, at Uniontown, Pa., where he remained until July, 1853, when, like many others, he got the Western fever, and following Horace Greeley's advice, he came west to Iowa, locating at Muscatine, where he entered the office of the *Muscatine Journal*, where he worked one year as a "jour," and then purchased a half interest in the paper. In January, 1855, in company with J. W. Logan, he started the *Muscatine Daily Journal*, which was one of the first dailies established in the State of Iowa. But his newspaper career was not of long duration, for during the same year he sold out to a man by the name of Early, and has never since engaged in the business. Whether his profit and loss account was so great that he became discouraged, or whether satisfied with the glory attained during his brief career as the manager of a leading daily of the State, is unknown to the writer. After disposing of his interest in the *Journal*, Mr. Wilson clerked for a time with Dunsmore & Chambers, dealers in dry-goods and furniture, after which he engaged with Charles Nealey, boot and shoe dealer, with whom he remained until the fall of 1858, when he came to Washington and embarked in the grocery trade in which he continued until 1865, when he sold out and became a partner in the firm of Wilson Bros., dealers in hardware. This partnership continued until 1871, when it was dissolved by mutual consent, Mr. Wilson retiring and again engaging in the grocery trade, in which he still continues, being the oldest dealer in that line of trade in the city.

In the fall of 1857, Mr. Wilson returned to Pennsylvania, and on the 13th of October of that year, he was united in marriage in Greene County with Miss Lucy J. Gray. By this union there were four children: Ella, now the wife of N. C. Corbin, of this city; Charles G., night foreman in the office of the *Chicago Daily News*; Frank L., of this city, who married Hattie Williams, daughter of J. Albert Williams, one of the leading shoe men of this section of the State; Robert, better known as "Bert," at home. Mrs. Wilson died July 3,

1869. She was a consistent Christian woman, a member of the Methodist Episcopal Church at Washington, and was universally esteemed by all who knew her. For his second wife, Mr. Wilson chose Miss Mary A. Beard, the marriage taking place Nov. 25, 1870. She is the daughter of W. T. Beard, of Washington, and is a native of Somerset County, Pa. To them have been born three children, two of whom died in infancy. Laura M. survives.

In politics, Mr. Wilson has, since the organization of the party, been an uncompromising Republican, and has always kept well posted in the various questions at issue. From time to time he has been honored by his fellow-citizens with local offices, having served for several years as a Councilman of the city of Washington, and in 1870 was elected Mayor and served one term. In 1871 he was elected a member of the House of Representatives of the Fourteenth General Assembly of the State, and served with credit to himself and to his constituents.

Since coming to Washington County, Mr. Wilson has been connected with almost every enterprise calculated to build it up, and has been ready to contribute of his means to that end. As a business man, he is conservative, yet withal enterprising, and success has crowned his efforts, he being numbered among the solid and substantial men of the city. He is connected with the Legion of Honor, United Workmen and V. A. S. Religiously, he holds fellowship with the Methodist Episcopal Church, his wife also being a member of that body.

of the Masonic Grand Lodge of Iowa, Newton entered that office in 1872 as a clerk, and in 1877 became deputy grand secretary. In 1885 the headquarters of the fraternity were removed to Cedar Rapids and on the death of his father in 1901 he became grand secretary as well as librarian of the Masonic Grand Lodge of Iowa, which positions he administered with fidelity and ability until his death. He was made a Mason in 1874 and advanced through all the degrees until 1895 when the thirty-third degree was conferred on him. He was vice president of the National Masonic Research Society, St. Louis, Missouri, and was recognized nationally and internationally as an authority on Masonry. The library his father and he built up is a credit to the order and to the state.

A. W. WILKINSON was born in Scott Township, Madison County, Iowa, November 22, 1848, and died at Winterset February 20, 1925. His parents were John and Clarissa (Matthews) Wilkinson. He was educated in district school and in Winterset Academy. He became a surveyor and was elected county surveyor in 1871 and served two years. He was admitted to the bar in 1872, but in 1873 went to California and followed civil engineering and school-teaching for two years. He returned to Winterset and January 1, 1875, opened a law office in Winterset and soon obtained a good practice. In November, 1882, he was elected district attorney for the Fifth Judicial District, and served four years, or until the office of district attorney was abolished. The fall of 1886 he was elected a judge of the Fifth District and by reason of re-elections served for sixteen years, or until 1902, when he resumed the practice at Winterset, in partnership with his son, Philip R. Wilkinson, continuing until his death. He stood high in his profession and as a citizen.

CHARLES HELLEN WILSON was born in Uniontown, Pennsylvania, April 25, 1834, and died in Washington, Iowa, February 28, 1925. His parents were William Wilson, Sr., and Minerva J. (Hellen) Wilson. He attended common school, but when seventeen years old, 1851, entered the printing office of the *Pennsylvania Democrat* at Uniontown. In July, 1853, removed to Muscatine, Iowa, and took employment in the office of the *Muscatine Journal*. In June, 1855, he purchased of Jacob and John Mahin their half interest in the *Journal*, his partner being Orion Clemens, a brother of Mark Twain, and they changed it to a daily. In 1858 he disposed of his interest in the *Journal* and removed to Washington where, for the next half century, he was in active business, for a time as groceryman, then as hardware merchant, as well as engaging in commercial enterprises. He was a leading member of the Methodist church, and an influential Republican. Besides being a member of the City Council, he was twice Mayor of Washington, and in 1871 was elected representative and served in the Fourteenth General Assembly.

## HON. CHARLES H. WILSON

MR. SPEAKER: Your committee appointed to prepare resolutions commemorating the life and services of the Honorable Charles H. Wilson, late of Washington County, Iowa, beg leave to report the following memorial:

Charles Helen Wilson was born in Uniontown, Fayette county, Pennsylvania, April 25, 1834, and died at Washington, Iowa, February 28, 1925. He was the son of William Wilson and Minerva J. Helen Wilson. He attended the common schools, and when seventeen years of age he entered a printing office to learn the printer's trade. He soon got the western fever, however, and came to Iowa, locating at Muscatine, where he got work in the Muscatine Journal. After working for about a year, he bought a half interest in the paper. His partner was Orion Clemens, a brother of Mark Twain. In January, 1855, Mr. Wilson, with his partner, established the Muscatine Journal, one of the first dailies in the state. Mr. Wilson married Lucy Jane Gray and to this union were born four children. After retiring from the newspaper business in 1858, the family moved to Washington, Iowa. Mrs. Wilson died July 3, 1869. Mr. Wilson was again married November 24, 1870, to Mary Alice Beard and to this union were born three children. In politics he was a Republican, in his church affiliations a Methodist, and he was conspicuously active in both politics and church work. Mr. Wilson was elected to the Fourteenth General Assembly of the State of Iowa. He was also city councilman for several terms, and was twice elected mayor of the city of Washington. Mr. Wilson lived an active and useful life, looking always toward the betterment of the social and moral conditions of the community.

*Therefore, Be It Resolved*, By the House of Representatives of the Forty-first General Assembly, that we extend our sympathies to the family and express our appreciation of his true worth.

*Be It Further Resolved*, That these resolutions be spread upon the Journal of the House and the Chief Clerk be directed to send an engrossed copy to the family.
