

## Death of Hon. George W. Butterfield.

Hon. Geo. W. Butterfield died very suddenly at his home in Greenwood on Tuesday morning, Dec. 9, at about 4 o'clock. It was a surprise and a shock to the people of this community when they went to their work and places of business that morning and were told that Mr. Butterfield was dead. It was hard to realize that the report was true, for Mr. Butterfield had been about town the day before, apparently enjoying good health, and no one had heard him complain. He retired at the usual hour on Monday evening. At a little after 1 o'clock Tuesday morning he got up saying he was not resting well. After sitting by the stove a while, Mrs. Butterfield said to him that perhaps it was best to send for a doctor; to which he answered very promptly, No. Said there was not very much the matter with him, and that he would be all right again soon. He sat up about an hour, and then went to bed again, saying he felt better, and urged Mrs. B. to go to bed for he was all right. She did so, but was soon after startled by a noise he made. She spoke to him, but received no answer. She stepped over to Mr. Herron's and asked Mr. and Mrs. H. to come to her assistance. When she got back to the bedside of her husband he breathed a few minutes longer and quietly passed away at about 4 o'clock.

George W. Butterfield was born in Brattleborough, Vt., February 20, 1810, and would therefore have been 75 years old had he lived until the 20st of February next. During his boyhood days his parents moved to Onondaga county, N. Y. He learned the trade of millwright, and, with the exception of two years in Canada, he lived in the state of New York and worked at his trade until 1856, when he came to Iowa, built several mills, among them the one at Chickasaw. In 1858 his family followed him, and they made their home at Greenwood, where he lived until the day of his death. He has been one of the leading citizens of this community and county ever since he came to the state, always taking an active part in all questions calculated to advance the interests of his neighborhood, county, state and the nation. He lived an honorable, upright life, was a true man, a good neighbor and all who knew him respected him for his integrity. His advice and counsel was sought on all public questions because his life had been such that men had become impressed with his honest motives.

sembly. He was justice of the peace for  
a number of years in this township, was  
re-elected to that office at the election  
last month. Whether a servant of the  
people or a private citizen he performed  
his duty as he conscientiously believed  
was right, and his acts generally turned  
out to be on the side of right, justice and  
the public welfare.

He was a member of the Masonic lodge  
and stood high with that fraternity. Dur-  
ing his connection with that order he held  
some of the most honorable and responsi-  
ble positions.

The funeral was conducted at the house,  
the officiating clergyman being Rev. S.  
W. Ingham, of Osage. While pastor of  
the M. E. church here, Mr. Ingham had  
formed the acquaintance of the deceased,  
and their friendship and respect for each  
other had been kept up through the past  
fifteen years. Mr. Ingham's remarks  
were so timely and came from such a sin-  
cere heart that all present were moved by  
them.

After the discourse by Mr. Ingham, the  
Masons, a large number of whom were  
present, took charge, and Geo. W.  
Butterfield was buried in Greenwood ceme-  
tery, in the lot selected by himself only a  
few weeks before his death.

A large gathering of friends followed  
the remains to the grave and paid their  
last tribute of respect to the deceased.

Thus another of the early settlers of  
our county has finished his work and has  
gone to rest. He died in the harness and  
will long be remembered for the good he  
has done. The immediate relatives who  
survive him are his widow and two sons,  
Geo. T. and H. L., both well known busi-  
ness men of this town.
