Thus Fort Dodge is to have a very attractive new federal building, the total cost of which is to be \$137,500. The original appropriation was \$130,000, but addition was made to fire-proof the structure.

Plan for Elevator

THEODORE HAWLEY DEAD

Pioneer of Fort Dodge will be Brought Here For Burial From Denver.

Theodore died Wednesday. Will reach Fort Dodge Sunday morning, 11:25 A. M. and St. L. Grace will remain here. Wrote full instructions Tuesday. Have service at Baptist church early Sunday afternoon. Will return to Des Moines same date. Herbert, Bessie and Anna will be with me.

The above telegram received early this morning by Frank Farrell conveyed the news of the passing away of Theodore Hawley, a resident of Fort Dodge from before the civil war until about 1889. He will be remembered by all of the older residents of this city, having been a prominent lawyer and land dealer.

Mr. Hawley visited Fort Dodge but a short time ago and shook hands for the last time with many of his old friends. His strength was gone then and it was apparent from what he said at that time that he felt his time to go was fast approaching. He had already suffered two strokes of paralysis and it is probable that a third stroke caused his death.

Mr. Hawley was eighty-two years old. His wife and three daughters, Mrs. Arthur Tappen of Peoria, Mrs. Grace Clark of Denver, and Mrs. Herbert Towner of Des Moines survive him. One son, Harry, has gone before.

Theodore Hawley was ranked by all who knew him in the years when he lived here as a brainy and fearless man. His career stands out among the prominent ones in those early strenuous times.

As the M. and St. L. does not have a train on Sunday at the time mentioned in Mrs. Hawley's message arrangements will be made to have the body transferred to the interurban car and brought to Fort Dodge that way. The funeral will be held from the Baptist church at 2:00 Sunday afternoon according to present plans. Interment will be in the family lot in Oakland cemetery.

FLIERS NEAR DEATH IN CHICAGO

Stone's Wife Compels Him to Wear Life Preserver

Chicago, Aug. 17.—Arthur Stone, driver of a Queen monoplane, was snatched from death at the international aviation meet after hopes for life had been given up.

Howard Gill in a baby Wright came almost as close to death, but escaped from under the wreck of his machine unhurt.

Lincoln Beachey, after flying far to the south and fighting his way back against the wind, gilded three thousand feet in safety to the aviators field after his engine had stopped.

James Ward flew for a long time circles over the harbor and Lake Michigan, but descended safely in the field after a few wobbles in the choppy wind.

Stone's machine fell into the lake just at dusk. He leaped from the falling plane and was rescued at point of exhaustion by a motor boat. He had supported himself in the water for more than half an hour. His machine was not wrecked. Stone was rescued was attributed largely to the insistence of his wife that he guard himself with a life preserver, in spite of the order that flyers should wear life preservers. Stone with others, started for the machine unguarded. Mrs. Stone, from the hangar just before the fall, insisted that her husband wear a life preserver while she tied an inflated automobile tire inner tube about his shoulders.

Vlastovka was a member of the Z. C. B. J. lodge of the Bohemians and of the Modern Woodman lodge of Otho.

SALVATION ARMY CAPTAIN ARRESTED

MEETINGS AT CENTRAL AVE.
AND SEVENTH FORBIDDEN

POLICE COURT SUNDAY A. M.

South Bend, Ind., Aug. 21.—A local judge holds that the Salvation Army has a right to hold services in the streets and must not be molested by the police.

Captain Charles W. Roshon of the Salvation Army corps, was arrested Saturday night for holding meetings at the intersection of Central avenue and Seventh street in violation of orders from the police department. Many of the occupants of the First National bank building some time ago filed objections against the holding of meetings there. Police Judge S. N. Magowan fined Captain Roshon \$50 and suspended the fine on good behavior. This is the culmination of several conflicts between the department and the Salvation Army people. Captain Roshon defended his right to hold meetings wherever he desires. He appeared in police court this morning.

Judge Magowan held court Sunday morning at 10:30. Three pairs of fighters and four drunks appeared before him. Ambrose and Frank Jones were up for scrapping in Public Square park at 5:00 Saturday afternoon. They each drew a fine of \$10 and a mittimus was issued against each to be served in case the fine is not paid. Archer and Charles Moore were accused of fighting on First avenue south and Sixth street. Their case is hanging fire. Fred Simpson and Lee Martin had a fist encounter in the Haymarket saloon and drew fines of \$10 each, which they paid.
