His father died when he was less than a year old, and his mother afterward removed with him to Wayne county, Ohio, where she was again married. Mr. Huff spent his early years on a farm and attended district school. It is said of him that he early in life detérmined to become a lawyer, and at the age of 16 years began the study of the law while he pursued his other school work in Edenburgh College, which was located near his home. In 1852, he entered the law office of Judge March at Muncie, Ind., and there continued until 1853, when he was admitted to the bar. In December of the same year he came to Iowa, and in the following spring he entered into partnership with J . D . Témple at Towa City: A year later he came to Hardin county and located at Hardin City, which was at that time
