# DEATH CLAIMS A. H. STUTSMAN, CIVIL WAR VET

Injuries received in a fall a few days ago resulted in the death today of Judge A. H. Stutsman, 93, veteran of the Civil War. Former prominent Iowa jurist and resident of Tustin for the past 34 years.

He died in his home at 1001 Newport road, Tustin, today after he had fallen in the house and struck his head on a chair in the fall.

Judge Stutsman had an enviable and outstanding record in the army and as a jurist. For several years in the early '70's he was judge of the First Judicial District Court of Iowa. He was city solicitor of Burlington, Iowa, for a number of years.

He fought in many battles in the Civil War as a member of Company C, First Iowa Cavalry, and lost his left arm in the battle of Bayou Meter, in Arkansas, in 1862.

A member of Santa Ana Sedge-wick post, Grand Army of the Republic, his death reduces the number of members of the post to 10, a sharp contrast with the more than 600 men who were members of the post here when it was organized.

Tribute to his military record will be paid by members of Sedge-wick post at the funeral services, which will be held in a ritualistic service in the chapel of the Win-higher Funeral home, 609 North Main street, next Tuesday at 10 a. m. with the Rev. Harry Evan Owings, minister of the First Baptist church, officiating.

Funeral services for his wife, who preceded him in death in August, 1931, will be held simultaneously, with double interment to follow in Inglewood cemetery, Los Angeles.

He is survived by two sons, Judge Carl A. Stutsman, of Los Angeles, and Walter A. Stutsman, of Tustin, and five grandchildren, Marion Stutsman Imus and Carl A. Stutsman, jr., both of Los

passed peacefully away in 1900, at the ripe old age of ninety-four. Judge and Mrs. Wightman quietly repose in beautiful Aspen Grove cemetery, which he helped to plat, and was the first to buy a lot where for forty-five years no spade had broken the sod for a grave.

Unto Judge and Mrs. Wightman four children were born, as follows: Wallace W., of Buena Vista, Colo.; Henry, deceased; Julia, the widow of Oscar Ward, residing in Chicago; and Joseph P., who lives in Evanston, Ill., where he is a retired employee of the railroad.

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#### HON. A. H. STUTSMAN.

EX-JUDGE A. H. STUTSMAN, now a resident of Santa Ana, Cal., was for many years a highly respected resident of Iowa, where he followed the profession of a lawyer. His parents settled on a farm west of West Point, Lee county, in 1842, and it was there our subject spent his boyhood days. When the Civil War broke out, he was one of the first to enlist in Company C, Iowa Volunteer Cavalry, July, 1861, in Burlington, and served till March, 1864, when he received a wound which caused the loss of one of his arms, and he was accordingly discharged. After this he read law at Fort Wayne, Ind., and was admitted to the bar in 1866. In 1870 he located in Burlington, and began his chosen profession. He was a strong politician, early in life having affiliated himself with the Republican party, of which later he became a leader. From 1874 to 1876 he filled the office of city solicitor, and in 1878 was elected judge of

the district court, the district being then composed of four counties. In 1882 he was re-elected without opposition, and at the end of his term returned to his practice in the city.

Both the judge and his estimable wife were active workers and devoted members of the First Baptist church. They still retain their beautiful home on Foster Street, to which their many friends and neighbors hope they will return. Mr. and Mrs. Stutsman are the parents of three sons and one daughter: Carl A., who for many years was associated with his father in the practice of law, and was also one of the young and enterprising alderman of the city for several terms, is with his parents in California, as are also Carrie, Walter, and Abraham. Judge Stutsman's family stood high socially, as well as prominently in business affairs, and during their long residence here have made many warm and true friends, who would give them a royal welcome were they to return to their old home.

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#### RICHARD SPENCER.

AMONG the self-made and highly respected men of Burlington we recall the name of Richard Spencer, who was born on the banks of the Susquehanna River, in the village of Jersey Shore, Lycoming county, Pa., Oct. 26, 1823. His father was of English and his mother of Scotch-Irish descent. The village schools afforded but little means of education in those days, but in 1837 the family moved to Ohio, and Mr. Spencer attended a better common school for a few months. In

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of introduction to me, and I introduced him to other lawyers in the courtroom. He subsequently located in Burlington, and through his studious habits and perseverance combined with his personal worth, gained an excellent standing in the profession, and the confidence of the people. He had previously made a fine record for himself while a resident of Lucas County. He was born in Morgan County, Indiana, in 1840. His father was a native of Pennsylvania, his mother of Kentucky; both were of German extraction. The family moved to Lee County, Territory of Iowa, in 1842, settling on a farm near West Point. Here he was reared and educated in the public schools, and labored on the farm until his enlistment in the War. After his return home he began the study of law in the office of J. M. Beck, at Fort Madison, and was admitted to the bar in 1865, at Keokuk. In the spring of 1866 he located at Chariton. He was elected Mayor of that city in 1867, but subsequently resigned to enter the law school of the Michigan University, from which he was graduated in 1868. In 1869 he was elected to and served in the House of the 13th General Assembly. The following year he came to Burlington. Here he was made City Solicitor in 1873 and 1874; Judge of the Police Court for the years of 1875, 1876 and part of 1877. In 1878 he was elected Judge of the District Court, and served in that capacity with such general satisfaction, that in 1882 he was re-elected for another term without opposition, at the end of which he returned to the practice. On account of his health he eventually took up his residence in California, leaving behind him an honorable record as lawyer, judge and citizen. He is still living in his 76th year at Santa Ana in that state, where he is widely and favorably known.

*Thomas W. Newman, William E. Blake and Daniel M. Hammack.*

These men were for a time partners. *Mr. Newman* was the elder of the two. He was a Marylander by birth and was admitted to the Bar of that State. He came to Burlington and entered the practice in 1850. He became a lawyer of note. For a time he was a partner of Joshua Tracy, under the firm name of Tracy & Newman, and subsequently of Mr. Blake under the name of Newman & Blake. These names will be found along the line of the Iowa Reports during their time. In 1874, he was appointed by the Governor, Judge of the District Court. Upon the expiration of that term, he was elected by the people for a new one, and upon the expiration of that, re-elected for another. He served some ten years in that position with marked efficiency. He was a good lawyer and a good judge. Nature had not been niggardly in the bestowal of his mental endowments.

He was born in Summerset County, Maryland, in 1829. His father having died, his mother with her family, when he was eleven years of age, removed to Baltimore where he was reared to manhood. He received an Academic education, and his associations in a large city like Baltimore naturally brought him in contact

Council of that order, a corporate member of the American Board of Foreign Missions to which he gave great attention and assistance till the latest period of his life. He was one of the founders of the Chicago Theological Seminary and a member of its first Board of Directors, to which he gave liberal contributions. He was an earnest scriptural student and of a devout turn of mind. He possessed a fine intelligence and a broad human charity. He was a brother of the wife of Governor and subsequently United States Senator, John H. Gear. He became interested in politics and was an influential member of the Republican Party. We were both members of the Tenth General Assembly, he of the Senate, and I of the House. He was one of the commissioners under whose supervision the new capitol building was constructed, and to his vigilant efforts, his strict integrity and efficient services in the duty assigned to him, much credit is justly due, for the almost unprecedentedly clean and honest construction of that superb building, which is as great a source of pride to the people of the State as the edifice itself. The commission was composed of four members, two of whom, Peter A. Dey and Maturen L. Fisher were Democrats, and two, Robert L. Finkbine and John G. Foote were Republicans—all men of high character, and to whom all honor is due. As one of the commissioners, he had charge of the finances and under his supervision nearly three million dollars were disbursed, without a cent of misappropriation. He might well be designated as one whom Pope declares to be the noblest work of God.

He was one of the original promoters of the Burlington and Missouri River Railroad, and for several years Treasurer of the Company; an organizer and member of the first telegraph company that built a line into Burlington, and one of the organizers of the First National Bank of Burlington. He was born in Middlebury, Vermont, in 1814, and died in Burlington in March, 1896, in the eighty-third year of his age. At this writing, he is survived by his widow, who is a sister of the late Joseph Merrill, one time a State Senator from Wapello County, and by a son, Graham Merrill Foote, who is an officer of the Long Beach Savings Bank, of California.

*A. H. Stutsman.*

I first saw Mr. Stutsman at the old courthouse in Ottumwa, some forty-five or forty-six years ago, not very long after the close of the great Civil War, in which he had been a valiant soldier. His armless sleeve pinned back, showed where he had lost an arm in that conflict. He had enlisted in the First Iowa Cavalry at the outbreak of the War and served therein for three years—until he received the severe wound which resulted in the loss of his limb. In appearance, he was slim, modest, and seemingly delicate. He had commenced the practice of his profession and for several years continued it at Chariton, in Lucas County. He was now seeking a new location and came to Ottumwa for that purpose. He bore a letter

Stutsman, 94 father of Superior Judge Carl A Stutsman of Los Angeles, and well known to many former Iowans as one of the early presidents of the Iowa Assoc of Southern California, died of a stroke yesterday on his orange ranch near Tustin, Orange County, California A native of Morgan County, Indiana, he was on the bench of the District Court of Burlington, Iowa, before coming to California more than 40 years ago. When Iowa picnics were held in Exposition Park years ago, former Iowans made him president of their association, a distinction now held by Judge Carl A Stutsman. Surviving are Judge Stutsman, another son, Walter A Stutsman or Tustin (CA) and 5 grandchildren. Former Judge Stutsman's wife, Mrs Frances Stutsman, preceded him in death in 1931 and in accordance with her wishes that her interment be deferred until his,
