Wants Prize Money.

Washington, Nov. 27.—Captain Chas. H. Davis, upon behalf of the crew under his command in Porto Rican waters, July 27 and 28 last year, brought suit in the district court of the District of Columbia to recover prize money due by reason of the capture of various vessels, stores and supplies. The amount claimed is \$62,795, of which one-half goes to the libellant and officers. Captain Davis' petition sets forth that he was in command of the United States vessels Dixie, Wasp, Annapolis and Gloucester; that there was captured by the American forces on the dates mentioned in and about the harbor of Ponce, Porto Rico, twenty-two merchant ships.
