Another Fatal Accident.

The JOURNAL is called upon a second
 time, within a week, to report the acci-
 dental death of another of Jefferson
 county's most respected citizens, that of
 Rev. John Hayden, of Liberty township,
 which happened last night under the
 following circumstances: Mr. Hayden
 had been out fishing, a pastime he very
 frequently enjoyed, and was returning
 home, walking along the Rock Island
 railroad track, when he became very
 tired and sat down upon the rail to rest
 himself. He in all probability must
 have become sleepily and being partially
 hard of hearing did not notice or hear
 a heavy freight train, as it came around
 the curve, until it was too late. The
 cow catcher of the engine struck Mr.
 Hayden and knocked him from the
 track and when he was picked up he
 was dead. The engineer did not see
 him in time to stop the train as they
 were coming around a short curve. Mr.
 Hayden was born in Hamilton, county,
 Ohio, in 1812, and married Miss Sarah
 McCotter, of Indiana, in 1834, the union
 of which brought them ten children.
 Mr. Hayden has been a minister of the
 M. E. church for nearly forty years;
 during which time he has been presid-
 ing elder for four years in Des Moines
 district, and for two years in the Janes-
 ville district, and has preached and held
 charges in all the large cities in Iowa.
 He was elected to the legislature in
 1868 from the First Congressional Dis-
 trict and served one term with credit
 to himself and constituents. He was
 highly respected by all who knew him
 and his sudden and unexpected death
 will be a great surprise to his large list
 of acquaintances.

 ed the body to Ottumwa where an in-
 quest was held, which adjourned until
 to-day without giving in their verdict.
 It seems this woman was pretty well
 known in Ottumwa as Marshal Harrison
 says she has been an inmate of the re-
 form school at Eldora some twelve years
 ago, and some ten years ago was before
 the insane commissioners of Wapello
 county, but was adjudged to be sane
 and discharged. There are all sorts of
 rumors about a man having been seen
 with her, riding on Second street, across
 the bridge and last turning off of
 Second street up Court street, in the
 direction of the place where the dead
 body was found. The last seen of the
 two being together was at the corner of
 Court and Second streets. There are all
 sorts of rumors afloat about the mur-
 derer which can not be traced to any
 reliable source. What object the mur-
 derer, who ever he was, had cannot be
 guessed as she had no money. It was a
 horrible affair and the outcome will be
 looked for with interest.
