PIONEER LAWYER AND JUDGE SUCCUMBS AT ADVANCED AGE.

JOHN KERR DIES IN NEBRASKA

Remains of Former Manchester Man Brought Here For Burial.
JOHN M. BRAYTON.

John M. Brayton died at his home at Delhi, Iowa, Monday, September 18, 1911, at the age of eighty years and 3 days. Mr. Brayton was born in Newport, New York, September 15, 1831. His boyhood was spent on a farm in Herkimer county, New York. At the age of fourteen years he went to Whitestone Seminary, where he remained four years. Mr. Brayton graduated from Hamilton college at Clinton, New York, in 1853. He attended the law school connected with the college under Prof. Theo. W. Dwight, and was admitted to the bar of the Supreme Court of New York in April, 1854. In the fall of the same year, he came to Delhi, Iowa, and soon after coming to Delhi, formed the law partnership with A. E. House, afterwards the firm became House, Watson & Brayton, and continued as such until Mr. House went into the army. He was elected state senator in 1864, which office he held until 1868. John M. Brayton, an old settler of Delhi, died September 18, 1911. He was taken with a chill Sunday morning and grew rapidly worse. The deceased was born in Newport, New York, September 15, 1831. He began the study of law at the age of fourteen and was admitted to the bar of the supreme court of New York in April 1854, and came to Delhi in the fall of the same year, and was engaged in his profession for years. He was state senator for four years and judge of the district court for one year. He was married to Miss Helen M. Martin, whose death occurred last April, after an illness of two days. Of late years Mr. Brayton has been engaged in farming. His survivor is his one daughter, Miss Emma B. Brayton. The funeral was held at the residence Wednesday afternoon. Rev. W. S. Skinner officiating.
