- He first settled in Montezuma, Poweshiek County, Iowa and then moved to Ottumwa, Wapello County, Iowa in 1867 where he lived after returning to Montezuma after the Civil War a short while.
- Military service - Civil War - Company F, 10th Iowa Volunteer Infantry, wounded, attaining rank of 1st Lieutenant.
- After the war he returned to Montezuma

he decided to kill them. Wornall says he picked up a hand axe from the floor and began raining blows upon the heads and faces of the helpless men. Mr. Winters, vice-president of the National Reserve bank of Kansas City and cashier of the army bank, was the first man attacked. Wornall says. A blow from the axe struck him in the back of the head. O. M. Hill and Carl Ohelson, clerks, were next struck down after which the man attacked Wornall and John Jewell who were at the opposite end of the room.

MEN'S HEADS CHOPPED.

Wornall says when he recovered consciousness he found his hands were not securely tied and managed to free himself and make his way from the building. Wornall was discovered by the sentry who gave the alarm.

Winters received four or five severe cuts on the head and forehead. Hill and Jewell were beaten about the head almost beyond recognition. Ohelson was apparently killed instantly by a blow on the forehead with the blade of the axe.

A feature of the case which attracted particular attention today was that Carl Ohelson's father, a Kansas City contractor who is building the new bank at the camp, went to the bank about the time the murders were committed.

MURDERER AVOIDS DISCOVERY.

He found the door locked and called out to Mr. Winters. The murderer must have answered for Winters, for he told Ohelson to return today. When Ohelson insisted that the matter was important, he says, a voice replied:

"Please go away. I'll come to the new bank and talk with you in just a few minutes."

Ohelson said he then left.

Today is pay day for the camp and it is supposed that there was an unusually large amount of cash on hand.

SENTRY FINDS VICTIMS.

The robbery and murders were revealed when a sentry heard groans and investigated. Mr. Winters was still alive. He was removed to the camp hospital where he died early today.

Immediately a guard was thrown about the camp and all military passes were revoked.

D. H. EMERY DIES AT HOSPITAL

WELL KNOWN OTTUMWA LAWYER CALLED BY DEATH AFTER THREE MONTHS' ILLNESS.

D. H. Emery, a well known Ottumwan, died at 2 o'clock this afternoon at the Ottumwa hospital following an illness of three months. He was 80 years of age.

Mr. Emery has been actively engaged in the practice of law in Ottumwa for the past forty-eight years and is well known in the city and vicinity. He was born in Fulton county, Illinois, December 4, 1837, and came to Ottumwa from Montezuma, Iowa, in 1867 and has made his home here since.

CIVIL WAR VETERAN.

He is a civil war veteran, having been a first lieutenant in Company F, 10th Iowa Volunteer Infantry. He participated in the advance on Corinth, Vicksburg and at Mission Ridge, where he was wounded by a minnie ball in the thigh. He returned to Montezuma following the war and was elected to the state legislature as a member of the house of representatives on the republican ticket in 1865.

MARRIED AT OSKALOOSA.

Mr. Emery was married May 23, 1867, to Mrs. Sarah C. Holland, daughter of Rev. B. Holland, at Oskaloosa. The following children survive him:

E. H. Emery, Mrs. Clara T. Wilson and Roscoe Emery of Ottumwa; Wilbur of Adrian, Mich.; Herbert of Winnipeg, Canada; Mrs. Harry E. Throne of Des Moines, and I. G. Emery of Evansville, Indiana.

While not actively engaged in public work outside of his law practice, Mr. Emery is very well known in the community. He has been a member of the Wapello county insanity committee for a number of years. The funeral arrangements will be announced at the First Methodist church Sunday morning.
