OBITUARY

Allen E. Holmes

Allen E. Holmes died at his home in Osage, Iowa, August 8, 1911, reaching the age of 76 years and 9 days.

He was born in Holmes county, Ohio, moving to Fulton, Illinois, when 15 years old. In 1861 he came to Iowa.

On the 18th day of August 1862 he was married to Hattie Cane. Seven children blessed this union, five of whom survive him.

In 1862 he enlisted in the army and served until the close of the war when he attained the rank of 2nd Lieutenant.

He served in the state legislature of Iowa as representative from Bremer county in 1866 and 1867.

Since 1868 he has been a resident of Mitchell county serving a supervisor of this county for two terms. He was a member of the Methodist church of Osage. His clean life has made him many true friends and his worth as a man has retained them all.

Services were held at the home Thursday morning at ten o'clock conducted by Rev. Mellott of St. Ansgar. Interment was made in the Osage cemetery.

ALLEN E. HOLMES

Mr. Allen E. Holmes was born in Holmes Co. Ohio on July 31, 1835 and passed away at his home in Osage, Iowa on August 8, 1911.

In 1850 he moved to Fulton, Illinois and in 1861 came to Iowa. On the 18th of August 1862 he was married to Miss Hattie Cane. Soon after his marriage he enlisted in the Union army and served until the close of the war having attained the rank of second lieutenant. In 1866 and 67 he was the representative from Bremer County in the State Legislature. In 1868 he moved with his family to Carpenter in Mitchell County, which was his home




