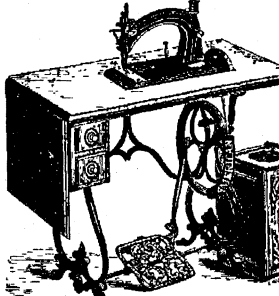

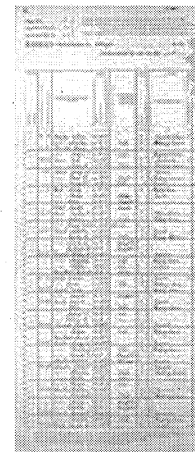

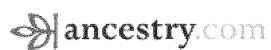

Report Soviet Concerned By Satellite Woes

LONDON (P)—News dispatches and diplomatic reports reaching London Monday pictured Soviet leaders as deeply concerned by signs that their satellite structure in eastern Europe is coming unstuck.

Three influential London newspapers—the Times, the Daily Telegraph and the Daily Mail—said significant changes in the Communist structure of power, both inside and outside Russia, were either under way or in the making.

The Telegraph said "the number of Soviet troops stationed in Poland has more than doubled in the last three months in an apparent effort to forestall any more Poznan 'bread and freedom' riots.

Plotting

The Daily Mail said "powerful factions in the Soviet Communist Party and the Red army high command are plotting to force" Nikita Khrushchev from his post as party boss. He was said to be too soft for old line Stalinists such as former Foreign Minister V. M. Molotov.

The Times suggested that the continuing independence of President Tito's Yugoslav Communists from Kremlin control is popular with the leaders of other European Communist states accustomed to unquestioning obedience to Moscow.

Anxiety

The Telegraph said editorially: "The ambitions of Marshal Tito, the head of an economically dependent and militarily negligible dictatorship, to form eventually a Balkan federation independent of Soviet control, are causing the Kremlin quite as much anxiety as the ambitions of Col. Nasser, head of an economically bankrupt and militarily negligible Middle Eastern dictatorship, to form eventually an Arab empire, are causing the West.

"And the disagreements within Moscow on how to come to terms

DEATH'S DOINGS IN PERRY.

The Grim Monster Visits Three Homes
in the City the Past Week.

Last Sunday morning our people
were startled by the announcement
that Al. T. Van Leuven had died very
suddenly the night before, as Saturday
evening up to 10 o'clock he was on the
streets appearing more cheerful than
usual. For sometime his health had
been failing, and for the last few
months he had been with a constant and
great sufferer with dropsy. His whole
system seemed to be flooded with
water. On the evening mentioned, he
went home, and as was his habit, went
out to the closet. Remaining an un-
usually long time his sister Nellie called
to him, and receiving no answer,
she called her nephew, B. F. Read, and
went out to investigate. When the
door was unfastened his lifeless body
fell out backwards, this and other cir-
cumstances indicating that he had died
soon after entering. It is thought that
the great mass of water in his system
broke through and literally drowned him.

The deceased was born in Des Moines
county in 1855, and came to Perry in
1872, and lived here most of his life.
He realized that his painful condition
was a source of much care and worry
for his aged mother and devoted sister,
who did everything possible for his
comfort, and tried hard to appear
joyful and as getting better. While in
health he was thoughtful of his moth-
er and carried \$2,000 life insurance for
her benefit, in the Macabees, which
order had charge of the funeral. The
services were held at the home Monday
afternoon, conducted by Revs. McDade
and Rosenberger. Tuesday morning
the remains were taken to Des Moines
and interred in Woodland cemetery.

Death came to the home of train
dispatcher E. W. Preston, on Tuesday
night, taking away his wife. Mrs.
Preston had been an invalid for several
months, and all medical aid was ex-
hausted in an effort to regain her
health. Consumption was the disease,
and the last few weeks she failed rap-
idly. She was a most estimable lady,
and her death brings sadness to all
who knew her. The bereaved husband
has the heartfelt sympathy of all in
his loss. The funeral services were held
last night at the home, and the re-
mains taken on No. 4 to Davis Junction,
Illinois, for interment.

Frances Eleanor Taylor was born in
Pennsylvania, April 16, 1831 and died
in Perry, Iowa, Oct. 31, 1899. She was
married to Joseph Jackson June 13,
1849. To the union was born two sons
and seven daughters, all living, and all
present at her funeral except one daugh-
ter. The funeral services will be held
this afternoon at the Baptist church
conducted by Rev. Coffman.

The deceased had been a sufferer
from heart trouble for a long time.
Since the death of her husband last
November, she has failed rapidly, and
suffered much. She lived a true Chris-
tian life and was one of the most noble
of all good mothers. She was open-
hearted and generous to a fault, and
her many kindly acts will live long in
the memory of the many to whom they
were extended. Her death brings
great sadness to all the family and
especially does it fall heavily upon her
daughter, Miss Minnie, who has been
her constant companion and support
for many years. The sympathy of all

HOTTEST PLACE.

The Mercury Reaches 140 Degrees on
the Persian Gulf.

Lloyd's Weekly: When we wilt,
sweater and perspire under the af-
flicting temperature of our hottest
summer days, we have one unflinching
consolation—it is hotter somewhere
else. In one region only of the ter-
restrial surface is such relief denied.
That region is the hottest place on
earth—the unhappy area in which the
agonized inhabitant is overwhelmed
with the fact that anywhere and every-
where else in the world the weather is
delightfully cool—by comparison. All
will be glad to know just where the
hottest place on earth is. In times
past there has been much disputation
over the subject, but the authorities
are now agreed on the spot I am about
to name. Curiously enough, this ter-
ritory is not a desert, not Fort Yuma,
not even the Arizona plains, although
a poet well described them by declar-
ing that the lost spirits, wandering from
their infernal abode, stood on the bor-
ders of that region, with eyes blinded
by the sun's reflected glare, then in
terror hurried back to their sulphurous
lakes—to avoid the heat. No, the hot-
test place in the world is, with all re-
spect to ocean summer resorts, on the
seashore. The region of maximum
temperature is an extensive area on
the Persian gulf, a part of the south-
western coast of Persia. This territory
includes the Bahrain or Aval Islands.
June, July and August are terrific,
endurable save to the natives, and hid-
cous to them. Day after day the mer-
cury will mark more than 100 degrees
in the shade. By day here I mean the
diurnal twenty-four hours. Think of
it, you who look with fearful eyes on
the thermometer that registers 100 de-
grees at noontime. Imagine the horror
of striking a match at midnight and
reading 110 degrees. It hardly seems
possible, yet it is officially declared
that this frightful heat is not exces-
sive—in that country. Often 140 de-
grees in the shade is attained in the
afternoon. The islands are a little
group, named after the largest—Bah-
rein. They lie between latitude 25 de-
grees 30 minutes and 26 degrees 30
minutes north and longitude 50 degrees
and 50 degrees 30 minutes east. Bah-
rein itself is about twenty-seven miles
long and ten miles broad. The popu-
lation of the group is 75,000. The na-
tives are for the most part Arabs, gov-
erned by a sheikh, who pays tribute to
the sultan of Oman.
